# From the Rector

## Abiding in Christ's Love

Some of the most profound words Jesus said to his disciples are those he said before he was killed in Jerusalem. He knew very well that his time had come to an end and needed to prepare his disciples for what was to come. In John 15:9-11, he said:

*“As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I*

*have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete.”*

These words of Jesus have been a great source of comfort for me following the sudden death of my mother who did not have a chance to say something to me before she died. I had been very much looking forward to spending time with her during my upcoming sabbatical but my timing was a few months off.

The greatest sense of comfort has been the experience of abiding in Christ's love flowing through my brothers and sisters in Christ. As soon as I shared the news that my mother had breathed her last, I started receiving phone calls, text messages, emails, donations, and many other expressions of love. Perhaps the most impactful forms of support were the many prayers that were offered on our behalf. The impact of those prayers began to be felt almost immediately. As soon as Bishop Justin finished praying with me, I was able to find air tickets for about 50% the normal cost. Then followed the safe travels and seamless planning and conduct of my mother's celebration of life. Everything went according to plan or much better than originally planned.

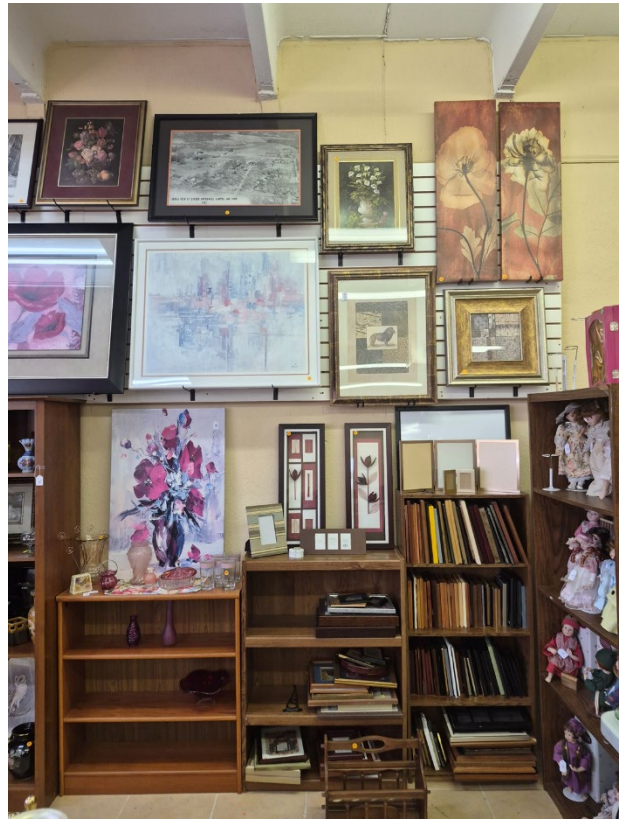
I believe that the words of Jesus are not just for times of grief but for all times. They are as relevant in good times as they are in tough times. Let us, therefore, strive to abide in his love by loving one another, in word and action, so that our joy may always be complete.

Even as I continue to grieve my mother's sudden departure from this life, I find great comfort and strength in the love that continues to flow through my brothers and sisters. By abiding in that enduring love, I am able to sing, Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!

## Light the Path Thrift Store Update

As of now, many of you are aware that with consent from the Vestry, the School Board established a task force to plan and operate a local thrift store that had closed, to raise funds for the school. The rationale for a Thrift Store was that the current sources of funding – scholarships, donations, fundraisers, grants, church support, etc., were not sufficient to keep up with the rising cost of operating our school. We needed other sources of income.

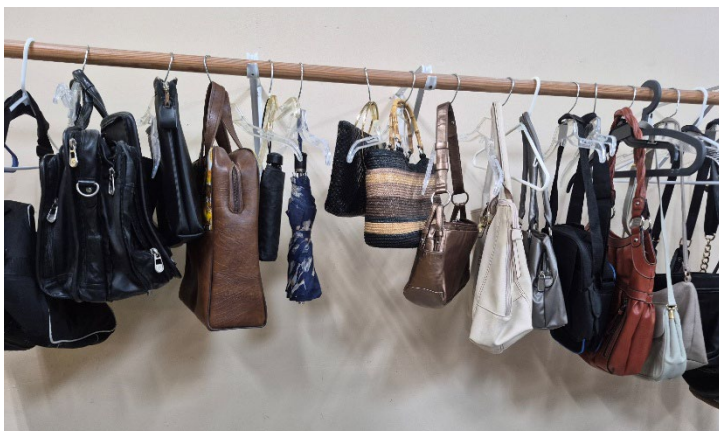
In early May, an agreement was signed that allowed us to lease the building that houses the Thrift Store and acquire all the inventory in the building. Immediately, the work of getting the store ready for operation begun. This involved cleaning the inside and outside of the building, cleaning and organizing the existing inventory, utilities, registration, etc. Thanks to the efforts of the members of the task force and a few dedicated volunteers, the store is about 70% ready for opening. The process of hiring the store manager is almost complete and June 26 has been designated as a potential date for a soft opening.



As anyone can imagine, taking on such a task is not easy. It requires a lot of time, talent, and great patience. We are grateful to God for the most dedicated and talented people on our task force and a few volunteers who have gotten us where we are. Our friends Bud and Lynn Kirby from St. Columba Episcopal Church in Marathon drove their RV and spent a whole week spending at least 10 hours on cleaning, organizing, and fixing things that needed to be fixed.

That said, these wonderful men and women cannot do all that needs to be done to get the store ready. We need more hands.

While we understand that many of you are already committed to other good causes, we hope you will share our story with as many people as possible. Soon we will be producing brochures, cards and flyers about the store that we hope you can share with your friends and neighbors. Meanwhile please pray that God will bring more volunteers to help in what we believe is noble work. Indeed, *“The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest.”* Matthew 9:37-38.

## **Light the Path Thrift Store**

The second thing I want to highlight is the new Light the Path Thrift Store. The contract for the Thrift Store was signed on May 11. Over the past few weeks Fr. Samuel's friends from The Keys, Lynn and Bud, spent over 10 hours a day straightening, cleaning, clearing, and reorganizing the thrift store with the help of our volunteers from Holy Trinity. They provided us with much needed advice and support on this new venture for our school. Additionally, Dennis Ritchie, a retired building construction contractor, serves as the task force leader. Dennis will be at the June 18 Vestry meeting. All parties that are interested in the Thrift store are welcome to attend the meeting to ask questions or just hear what Dennis has to say about the progress of the Thrift store, such as cleanup efforts, status of the store, and the need for volunteers. The Thrift Store will have a soft opening sometime in June, and a grand opening in the Fall.

## INVITE WELCOME CONNECT

May's Tidings focused on inviting people to church. This month, we ask the next important question: how do we help visitors feel truly welcome?

### How We Welcome Visitors:

- Ushers greet visitors at the door.
- The priest welcomes them during announcements.
- They receive a visitor packet and an invitation to coffee hour.
- After their first visit, they receive a note from the IWC Committee & an email from Fr. Samuel.

These are meaningful first steps, but belonging grows over time. Each of us can help by making newcomers feel seen, known, and included. Often, a simple introduction, a friendly question, or connecting someone with a shared interest can make all the difference.

### Holy Trinity Church and School Picnic



More than sixty people attended the fourth annual church and school picnic for an afternoon of fellowship, school tours, student displays, a trivia competition, and musical entertainment. The trivia contest engaged both the participants and the audience, as spectators cheered on their teams while trying to guess the correct answer themselves. If you asked four-year-old Ryan, grandson of Deb and Mike Lally, what the best part of the trivia competition was, he would say “ringing the buzzer.”

The afternoon featured a performance by The Elderly Brothers, a barbershop quartet which included Holy Trinity's own Don Hausmann. This was the quartet's third and final picnic appearance before retiring. They invited Fr. Samuel to join them for their closing song, Everybody Wants to go to Heaven, but Nobody Wants to Die.

The Men's Group served hot dogs, hamburgers, and BBQ chicken, and the attendees provided side dishes and desserts. Special thanks to the HTES LEOs for helping with setup and cleanup.



### **Military Appreciation Month & the Observance of Memorial Day**



In collaboration with Rob Soeldner, a member of The Episcopal Church's Veteran and Armed Forces Advisory Committee, and the Men's Group, the IWC helped plan several meaningful activities at Holy Trinity in observance of Military Appreciation Month and Memorial Day. These events provided our church family with an opportunity to remember, honor, and express gratitude for the men and women who have served and continue to serve our country.

On Saturday, American flags were placed on veterans' graves in the cemetery and throughout the courtyard. On Sunday, a special bulletin honored those who served our country, followed by a tribute and prayer in the courtyard between services and a patriotic pancake breakfast.

Two tribute tables honoring veterans were on display in the Parish Hall. One featured a "Missing Man Table," which is a solemn symbolic arrangement accompanied by an explanation of the meaning behind each item on the table. The other recognized all branches of military service and highlighted their history.



### **SMALL TABLE EXPLAINED:**

The small table occupies a place of dignity and honor near the head table. It is set for one, symbolizing the fact that members of our corps are missing from our ranks, They are referred to as prisoners of war and missing in action. We call them comrades.

This table, set for one, is small, symbolizing the frailty of one prisoner, alone against his or her suppressors.

The tablecloth is white, symbolic of the purity of their intentions to respond to their nations call to bear arms.

The single rose in the vase, signifies the blood that many have shed in sacrifice to ensure the freedom of our beloved United States of America.

The rose also reminds us of the family and friends of our missing comrades who keep the faith, while awaiting their return.

The yellow ribbon on the vase represents the yellow ribbons worn on the lapels of the thousands who demand with unyielding determination, a proper accounting of our comrades who are not among us tonight.

A slice of lemon on the plate reminds us of their bitter fate. The salt sprinkled on the plate reminds us of the countless fallen tears of families as they wait.

The glass inverted -they cannot toast with us this night. The chair is empty -they are not here.

The candle is reminiscent of the light of hope which lives in our hearts to illuminate their way home, away from their captors, to the open arms of a grateful nation.

### Chocolate Cherry Pie

2 9 inch chocolate pie crusts                      8 ounce cream cheese  
1 cup powdered sugar                                21 ounce cherry pie filling  
2 8oz Cool Whips                      1 ½ cups semi sweet mini chocolate chips  
Maraschino cherries to garnish



- Beat the softened cream cheese with powdered sugar until fluffy and smooth
- Gently add in the cherry pie filling
- Fold in cool whip until combined
- Fold in 1 cup of the mini chips
- Divide filling between the two crusts
- Top with cool whip and sprinkle with a few mini chips

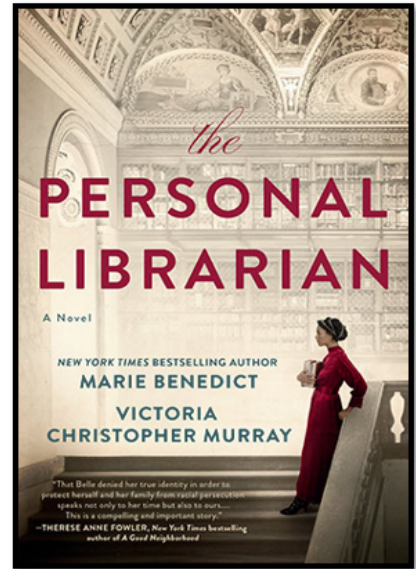

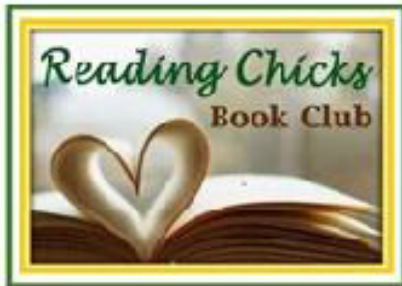

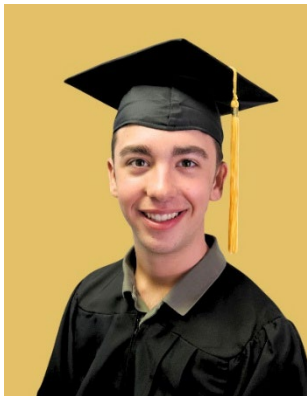
## Holy Trinity Graduation

Congratulations to the Students of Holy Trinity Episcopal School Class of 2026!

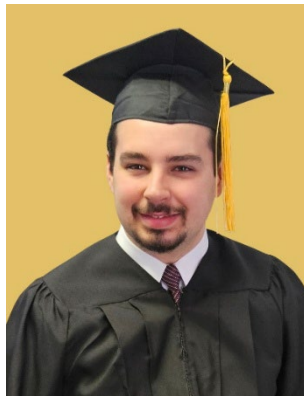

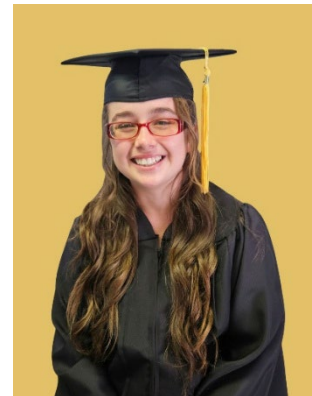

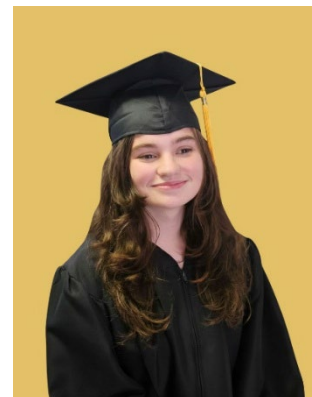
