The Holy Spirit: God’s Gift to Believers

“Do not leave Jerusalem until the Father sends you the gift he promised ...” (Acts 1:4).



As I look forward to the month of May, I am thinking about the major events happening during the month and reflecting on the meaning and significance of each of them. I am thinking about Mother’s Day (May 12), Pentecost Sunday (May 19), and our school’s Graduation Day (May 17). Each one of these events is significant in our individual and shared lives. In this article, I wish to share my thoughts on the significance of the Day of Pentecost scheduled for Sunday May 19.

Like many feast days, Pentecost seems to come and go; leaving little or no impact on us. That was certainly not so with the disciples and all those who witnessed the first Pentecost in Jerusalem. For many, it was a life-changing experience. It was the beginning of a new way of thinking and living; a new life in the power of the Holy Spirit. Indeed, it is described by many to be the birthday of the church. No wonder Jesus told his disciples not to leave Jerusalem before they could experience this outpouring of God’s gift to believers. (Acts 1:4).

The manifestation of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost was so significant that it changed the dynamics of the disciples individual and group life. Before Pentecost, they had been preoccupied by concerns personal privilege and safety; now they were concerned with everyone's wellbeing. They certainly were not afraid of anything. They had been given both the desire and the power to be Christ's witnesses (Acts 1:8); loving one another, learning from one another, sharing with one another, and praising God together (Acts 2: 45-47; 4:32-35).

What is interesting is that every time the disciples gathered, there was some recurrence of the Pentecost experience. When the disciples gathered in prayer following Peter and John's persecution, "the meeting place shook, and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit." (Acts 4:31). When Peter visited Cornelius's house, "the Holy Spirit fell upon all who were listening to the message. The Jewish believers who came with Peter were amazed that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out on the Gentiles, too. For they heard them speaking in tongues and praising God." (Acts 10:31). When Paul met and laid hands on some believers in Ephesus "the Holy Spirit came on them, and they spoke in other tongues and prophesied." (Acts 19:6).

It is clear to me from these examples, that the gift of the Holy Spirit was not poured unto the believers once for all on the day of Pentecost; rather, it was meant to be a regular occurrence every time the believers gathered in love and anticipation. Pentecost is and should be an ongoing experience. No wonder Paul urges the Ephesians to continually "be filled with the Holy Spirit" (Ephesians 5:18-20).

The need for a continuous outpouring and demonstration of the Spirit's presence does not in any way negate our belief that all baptized people received the Holy Spirit at their Baptism. At baptism God "anointed us, set his seal of ownership on us, and put his Spirit in our hearts as a deposit, guaranteeing what is to come. (2 Corinthians 1:21-22). The question here is, therefore, not whether the Holy Spirit lives in us or not, because Jesus made it clear when he told his disciples that "When I am raised to life again, you will know that I am in my Father, and you are in me, and I am in you." (John 14:20). The real question is whether the Holy Spirit who has been deposited in us is active in our daily lives; comforting, teaching, convicting, empowering,

sanctifying, and transforming us into the kind of people we are called to be – people who are bearing the fruits of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control." (Galatians 5:22).

The good news we get from the early, and some modern, believers alike, is that there are things we can do to allow the Holy Spirit to become more active in our lives. There are things we can do to experience Pentecost over and over again. I will share just a few:

Humility: The first thing we need before we can experience the outpouring and manifestation of the Holy Spirit is humility. Pride is the greatest obstacle to experiencing the outpouring of God's Spirit. We need the humility to admit that we are not where we need to be; and that we cannot get there on our own. We need to admit that we need the power of the Holy Spirit to work in us and through us in order for us to be and do all that God has intended for us. This kind of humility is best demonstrated by the believers in Ephesus who were asked by Paul whether they had received the Holy Spirit when they first believed. They were humble enough to admit that they did not even know that there was such a thing as the Holy Spirit. (Acts 19:2). Once they understood that there was indeed such a thing as the Holy Spirit, they were more than willing to let Paul lay hands on them to receive the Holy Spirit.

Desire: The second thing we need to experience Pentecost over and over is a desire for more of God and all he has to offer. Remember the disciples had received the Holy Spirit when Jesus breathed on them after the resurrection. (John 20:22). They could easily have argued with Jesus that they already had the Holy Spirit when he told them not to leave Jerusalem before receiving the Holy Spirit. Because they desired more of God, they were willing to wait till the day of Pentecost; and what they experienced was no where close to what they had experienced before. Do you desire more of God's Spirit?

Availability: The third thing we need to be filled with the Holy Spirit is availability. In our busy world, we tend to want things to happen on our own timing. Notice that Jesus did not tell the disciples to wait until a certain day. He told them to wait in Jerusalem till they received the promise of the Father. It did not matter to them how long it would take. They were available. We see the same attitude

in the story of Peter's visit to Cornelius. Cornelius said to Peter, "Now we are all here in the presence of God to listen to everything the Lord has commanded you to tell us." (Acts 10:33). No time limit. Experiencing Pentecost will undoubtedly involve some unspecified waiting.

As we look forward to the feast of Pentecost, may we be humble enough to admit our need for more of the Spirit's work in us; may we develop a hunger and thirst for more of the Spirit, and may we avail ourselves for the outpouring and transforming work of the Holy Spirit in us and through us. May this year's feast of Pentecost be for you and me, a life changing one; just like the first Pentecost. Come Holy Spirit, Come!

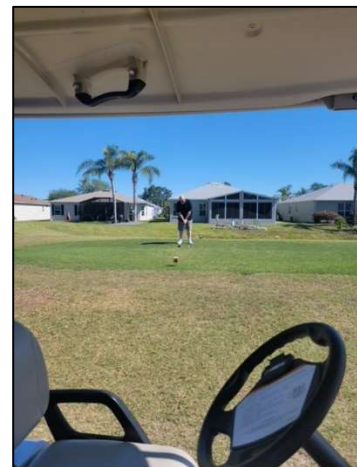
