Sr. Warden's Message

Happy New Year my friends! I pray this finds you all well and safe. This may be one of our happiest of a New Year just because it means 2020 is over.... phew, what a year. But we made it through 2020 and there are high hopes for 2021 as we can finally see a light at the end of the pandemic tunnel. 2021 the year of "Renewal, Revitalization, and Reunion"

We start 2021 with a busy schedule that we have begun planning for. Our new Rector, Fr. Samuel Nsengiyumva, joins us at the end of January, just in time for our Annual Meeting on January 31, the Diocesan Convention follows on February 6, and the Celebration of Ministry for Fr. Samuel follow on February 21. Typically these events take quite a bit of planning and preparation, but like everything else this past year, much more planning and work by many is necessary to conduct these events safely and with as many parishioners participating as possible.

Our Annual Meeting on January 31st, will be conducted similar to our streamed services except it will be conducted using Zoom so that interaction can occur. The meeting will be held in the Parish Hall, with similar seating used for 9 am worship services, this will allow about 24 parishioners to attend in person while all others can participate via Zoom and be present on the

large screen TV. An initial meeting has been held with a Diocesan staff member that has conducted several of these types of large group meetings.

The Diocesan Convention this year will be conducted entirely via Zoom. Where voting is required, they will be using an application that facilitates on-line voting. This year our meeting will not require voting as the Diocese has determined that our Vestry must stay intact for one more year to provide continuity for Fr. Samuel. This means at the 2022 Annual Meeting six (6) new vestry members will be elected.

Our Worship Services continue to go well and Christmas Eve was very well attended in our beautifully decorated Church and Parish Hall. There were only a few empty chairs. Thank you, Rev. Janice and Fr. Ted, for a wonderful service. It was great to see so many of us back together again. Hopefully, many of you who have yet to come to service will give it a try one of these Sunday's. There are many who work hard to make our services as good and safe as they are, but I want to give a special "Thank You" to Pat Casson's fiancé Dave Fleming. He has done a remarkable job working with a tangled mess of cables, wires, and equipment, including a recent failure of our main amplifier, so that "the show can go on". Thanks, Dave, for your talents and commitment to keeping us connected.

Each week we pray for the students and staff of our school, in January please say a special prayer for them as the students come back in-person on January 4th. This is state mandated, and since our funding predominately comes from the state, we must comply. Justin McCallister, Head of School, has done a great job of preparing a plan and personal protection for this return, but an additional prayer may help to assure their safety and wellness.

Please stay diligent and remain safe and well until we can all Reunite again. Hopefully, that is not too far off.

Vestry Minutes

December 14, 2020

The meeting was opened at 6:30 PM with prayer by Randy Siver.

The presenters have evaluated the roof of the church and parish hall. They discussed the problems with the roofs and ceiling inside the church. The company Dean Adjustment-Contractor had several suggestions and recommend that the roof be replaced. They also recommend that we claim the roof damage with our insurance company and will assist us in that

endeavor. They have the documented dates of wind damage. It was suggested that we also have them inspect the Rectory. Randy will move ahead with the roof project.

Holy Trinity Episcopal School—Justin McCallister

1. Human and Capital Resources:

- <u>Covid-19 Supplies</u> Covid-19 supplies have been and are currently being ordered to make sure the school has enough for its Spring Reopening.
 - Masks The school currently has over 300 masks that have been donated by both Lake County and Florida Health Departments.
 - Disinfectants Automatic hand sanitizer machines have been ordered and will be placed in the office and classrooms. Multiple quantities of wipes have been ordered and will be provided for teachers and their classrooms.
 - o <u>Desk Shields</u> Once the CARES Act budget has been approved, student desk shields will be ordered.

2. Students & Families:

- Covid-19 Reopening Procedures Justin McCallister has created reopening procedures for HTES that will be implemented in January. They will provide guidelines for returning students, families, and faculty to help prevent the spread of Covid-19.
- <u>Update Executive Order and Spring Reopening Plans</u> The Governor on Nov. 30, 2020 updated Emergency Order 20-52 which stated that all brick-and-mortar schools must be opened Monday-Friday no later than January. The

update included parental options to have their students return to in-class instruction or to remain virtual.

HTES – We are set to reopen on Jan. 4th, 2020. We will be open Monday-Friday and will provide in-class instructions to parents who have requested it. This will be in compliance with the updated Emergency Order. We will also continue virtual classes for students and families who remain home.

3. Finances:

• Scholarship Distribution

November saw the final deposit of McKay Scholarship checks, Step-Up, and Gardiner scholarships. The next release of scholarship checks will not be until February.

Financial Reports: Russ Casson

Financial reports were reviewed and accepted. After discussion, it was decided that Russ will put an article in the Tidings regarding the financial status of the church each month.

Old Business: David Aldrich

The In-Person services are going well. Attendance at the 10:30 service in the church remains near, but not at our max, we have not had to turn anyone away in the past month. Wasps were a major problem this week, flying throughout the church, bothering and alarming parishioners. I killed about eight during the service, we killed many more afterwards, and fortunately nobody was stung to my knowledge. There is a problem with our sound system which others will address. The 9:00 service in the Parish Hall has completed four weeks; typical attendance is about 7-9. It has gone well; both services are attended mostly by the same core of people. We have had no new visitors, outside of a couple of family guests, just a few returning "snowbirds". We are now comfortable with using just two ushers.

Team Updates Building and Grounds—Randy Siver

Window replacement project is underway. We should see the first window this week or next. I visited the contractors shop last week and the pieces were all built and being put together for installation of glass and painting.

Painting of the church will be completed this week. I also had the painters do the high peaks of the Parish Hall and the parishioner/volunteers will do the lower half. The painters had the equipment to do the high peaks and this was much safer than having volunteers to the high painting.

School siding has been started and will continue for the next several weeks.

The new television has been installed in the parish hall and will ready to use for Christmas Eve service.

The Rectory work has been completed and is ready for Fr. Samuel and Rose.

Finance Team—Mark Weldon

The latest pledge numbers are - Offerings \$202,234, Building Fund \$6625, School \$240.

From Sid Yee, and for vestry approval, are the recommended Golf Tournament amounts to be transferred to the school's budget, and the amount to be set aside for next year: Of the \$13,932.89, that is available, I'm recommending \$12,132.89 be transferred to the school's operating budget. I'm asking \$1,800 be reserved for the 2021 tournament's initial expenses as follows:

For vestry and Treasurer discussion: It has been suggested that we include a brief financial report in the monthly Tidings, so that parishioners have a better idea of our financial situation. It might look something like the chart included in the monthly Lamplighter at a church in Wisconsin

at http://www.emmanueloshkosh.org/20-11-NOVEMBER LAMPLIGHTER.pdf. It basically lists income, expenses, and surplus/deficit (just totals) for the most recent month and for year to date.

I have received an inquiry about making a bequest to our endowment fund. As discussed, some time ago, until the threshold of \$10K is reached we will need to hold any such bequest in a local account. After the New Year I will review our planned giving program, reconstitute the committee, and make plans for a rollout of the program hopefully soon after Father Sam is in place and we can begin to meet in person when it is safe to do so.

Communications—Deb Yee

Rectory visits were completed with 5 visitors over the three hours. Deb has been working on setting up the technology for the use of the TV in the Parish Hall for Christmas Eve service.

The sound amplifier went out and equipment was borrowed by from Fruitland Park Lions Club for the service. Lori was able to borrow the needed equipment. Sid Yee has been in contact with Marion Music regarding the repair or replace; the amplifier will need to be replaced. Sid is pricing the different brands and will need to decide on replacement after the first of the year. We are able to provide effect sound through the Christmas season.

Parish Life—Barbara Cogley

The Parish Hall Decoration committee has just about completed the work. The TV will be set up for streaming and other uses after the Christmas Season; it will be set up for Sunday service for Christmas. Diane Casson and the Altar Guild will be deciding which of the older pictures to place back on the wall and the school will developing their bulletin board when they return to school in January. I want to thank the committee for all their work: Nancy and Terry Mitchell, Rod Whetsell, Jeanne Nicolosi, and Diane Casson.

A committee will be formed to decide on the welcoming for Fr. Samuel and Rose. Please contact me if you are interested in helping with this committee. We will meet after the first of the year to make plans. I will be working with

the IWC committee also. Date of a welcoming reception is subject to the status of the virus and safety of parishioners.

Invite, Welcome, Connect—David Aldrich

The Invite, Welcome, Connect committee met December 4th. Nancy Browne has updated the visitor gift bags and will do that on a regular basis. We have had a few of our post cards returned as undeliverable. I am not aware of anyone yet attending live services as a result of our mailing but some could be looking at us on line. At this time, with finances as they are we have no more cards/stamps in the works.

Father Samuel is familiar with the IWC, in fact he personally knows Mary Parma, the leader and founder of the ministry. He had people set up to attend an IWC workshop at his current church when the COVID hit so we have high hopes for the coming year.

We also discussed some ideas of how we could welcome the new priest and family. One of the ways suggested was have a service and after the service have three areas set up with coffee and serve finger sandwiches on paper plates and they could walk from place to place to meet people. We could put flowers and fruit on the counter in their house with a welcome card. There were suggestions to put some breakfast stuff in the refrigerator so they can have breakfast. At some point there will be an installation and hopefully we can have a bigger celebration at that point.

Some discussion came up to get our name around town maybe buy golf shirts with our church name. It would be good advertising at the golf tournament. Something to think about in the future.

Hearing Loop Project

I met with Matt King, Project Manager of Complete Hearing Solutions, LLC on Wednesday, December 9 to determine the feasibility of installing a Hearing Loop in Holy Trinity Church. He laid coil on the perimeter of the interior of the church (not including the section where the choir normally sits) and determined through various measurements that we would have excellent gains in sound for attendees who have a t-coil enabled hearing aid. I am expecting a proposal to come near the date of the Board meeting and will forward it on. A typical cost for a church of our size is \$5,000-\$6,000.

Deb had provided an excellent start to the project. I spoke with several people from each of seven churches in or close to The Villages. Complete Solutions was the only vendor who received rave reviews. I asked for the names of companies that were asked to bid on the project when Complete Solutions was selected and was given several, but none was recommended. These vendors don't appear to be in business at this time.

Should we sign a contract with Complete Solutions, they will give me the name of an individual who provides a grant to churches like ours amounting to 10% of the cost. Matt felt our getting this grant was more than likely. Should this occur, I will complete the paperwork.

New Business

Annual meeting - the plans will be for meeting on January 31st and a virtual session. There will no election of Vestry as they will remain the same for another year because of calling a new Rector as per Diocese regulations. Details will follow in early January.

Meeting closed with prayer by Randy Siver at 9 PM.

This year has seen quite a few projects as I hope you have been able to see. I have listed the ones I can think of.

1) Painting of the church building, walkways and steps, and the 4 highest peaks of the parish hall. NOTE: We are going to paint the remainder of the parish hall ourselves.

- 2) Removal of the 2 "mountains" of soil from the back of the church property by Nevin Mathews. (The man has his own tractor)
- 3) Building of the "horseshoe" walled/raised garden in front of the school. Many thanks to Nevin, Bob Mustin, Bruce May, and Syd Yee.
- 4) Painting of school bathrooms. Bob Mustin did a fantastic job.
- 5) Remodeling of the rector's office. Bob Mustin, again did a yeoman work on this project.
- 6) Working with Barb Cogley's team we were able to complete a "cleanup" of the parish hall including mounting a new 55" T.V. Also providing a new space for our school to present themselves and their projects for our viewing.
- 7) During the past 3 weeks we have been working with a plumber to track down our "low" problem. They seem to have a handle on it and we will be testing some things next week to see where we are.
- 8) The rectory has been repaired and put in living order for Fr. Samuel and Rose.
- 9) The Church window project has been quite the challenge but things are on the right track now. The 1st window set will be installed in early January.
- 10) A complete parish inventory was done.
- 11) Bob Disinger agreed to head up our disaster preparedness program. Scott Cogley agreed to teach CPR/AED classes. All of this is on hold due to Bob's health and the COVID-19 crisis.
- 12) New signage was added to our school/office.
- 13) Brick fencing and the Lynch Gate were painted.
- 14) The residing of the east wall of the school has stalled but shows promise in the near future.



this ministry to Honor those who served us all. We will do it all again this next year. Thank you,


