The Gift of Resilience

"... but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been



given to us." Romans 5:3-5.

The above is one of the many verses in the Bible that can be a source of great encouragement in such a time as this.

Watching the news

about the surge in COVID-19 infections, hospitalizations and deaths, the tragedy in Afghanistan, the earthquake in Haiti, the floods in Tennessee, and other distressing news, one may wonder whether there is any hope for better days ever. The good news is that Yes, there is still hope.

Perhaps the question to ask is how to find and maintain hope in the midst of so much suffering. I wish to suggest that such hope is found and sustained by the gift of resilience. Resilience is a term that has attracted the attention of scholars and practitioners from a variety of disciplines. It is defined as the "ability to overcome or recover

from adversity." In other words, the question to ask is: How do we overcome or recover from the adversities of our time? In my experience, there are at least three things we need to be and remain resilient.

Gratitude

Gratitude as it relates to resilience is the ability to find something good in the midst of so much that is bad. When we see something good in the midst of so much that is bad, we realize that there is some hope left. We are able to see some light at the end of the tunnel. That light gives us reason to keep going and looking forward to the time when good will eventually overcome evil. Even with the distressing images out of Afghanistan, I found myself feeling grateful that somehow God has spared the 6 million residents of Kabul from the horrors of war. While the situation there is very volatile, uncertain, complex, and ambiguous (VUCA), the ongoing evacuation is giving hope to so many.

Creativity/Agility

One of the ways we are able to be and remain resilient in the face of adversity is by creatively adjusting to the situation by finding new ways to accomplish your goals. I have been amazed at how this pandemic has unleashed a wave of creativity which will serve us well for many more years to come.

Patience

Perhaps the greatest factor in one's ability to remain resilient in the face of adversity is patience. Patience is defined as "the capacity to accept or tolerate delay, trouble, or suffering without getting angry or upset." We need to be patient with ourselves, with others, and more importantly with God.

As I look at the challenges of our time, I am grateful for the gifts of gratitude, creativity/agility, and patience that I see in our parish family. These gifts have helped us overcome so much adversity and will help us recover from whatever is yet to come. My prayer is that God will fill us with more gratitude, more creativity/agility, and more patience. May the suffering of our time produce in each one of us endurance, character, and hope that does not disappoint.

"For in this hope we were saved. But hope that is seen is no hope at all. Who hopes for what they already have? But if we hope for what we do not yet have, we wait for it patiently." Romans 8:24-25

Below is an excerpt from Bishop Brewer's email sent recently regarding revised COVID-19 guidelines across the diocese.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The past few weeks have offered a reminiscent glimpse of diocesan life pre-COVID-19: joyand spirit-filled priesthood ordinations, long overdue family gatherings and the familiar combination of excitement tinged with nervousness felt by our youth as they returned to a new school year. Quite frankly, it has been marvelous to do "normal" again.

As many of you know, I rise early, enjoying the quiet of a new day and sharing time with God as I prepare my mind and heart for what lies ahead. This morning I was overcome by the need to write down all that is stirring within me as I try to process the unsettling news and current events taking place in our own community and on the world stage: rising numbers of COVID-19 cases in overcrowded, understaffed hospitals, a devastating and deadly earthquake in Haiti and chaos and desperation in Afghanistan. It is as if all of the gains we had been making have vanished and that we are back to where we were a year ago. A verse from the Psalm appointed for this morning's Eucharist scriptures seems to have been written for a time such as this:

Search me out, O God, and know my heart; try me and know my restless thoughts.

-Psalm 139:22

Despite our weariness, the time has come to revise our diocesan COVID-19 guidelines. Our concern is for the safety of all persons which calls for our willing sacrifices during the escalation of the highly contagious COVID-19 variants. Each of our churches is impacted differently by COVID-19 and I recognize that Rectors might need to make adjustments to best

fit their own unique congregation. Please note, however, that when I visit churches in our diocese, I will expect all of these guidelines to be in place. I also strongly encourage those who have not yet been vaccinated to do so and for those who have been vaccinated I urge you to discuss receiving a booster vaccine with your medical professional.

Vestry Minutes Summary

August 18, 2021

Present: Fr. Samuel, Dan Curtis, Jim Kelly, Sara May, Russ Casson, Peggy Barry, David Aldrich, Mark Welton, Barbara Cogley.

Absent: Liz Mustin, Deb Yee, Randy Siver, Justin McCallister.

Fr. Samuel opened the meeting with prayer at 6:40 PM.

Holy Trinity Episcopal School—Jim Kelly stated that school began on August 16th and that we have 45 students. Planning continues for the Annual Holy Trinity School Golf Tournament on October 30, 2021, a fundraiser for the school. Online registration will open soon.

Jim also stated that the Salvation Army is very happy with our participation in their programs and that we are a great help to them. They presented our workers with Salvation Army shirts.

Russ Casson, Treasurer, reported that July is the first month of the school year and activity was light with little revenue reported.

Old Business

Worship services were discussed in length and the safety of our congregation was our primary concern. The Diocese has sent new guidelines regarding the COVID concerns in Central Florida. The decision was made to strongly encourage masks at all services regardless of vaccination status and masks are to be worn when singing. We will reinstate the practice of ushers releasing individuals at the end of service by row, starting from the back of the church, to

prevent close contact. Coffee hour was discussed and Jim Kelly made a motion to suspend coffee hour for the time being, second by David Aldrich, unanimously approved. Bounce Back Sunday which was planned for Sunday, October 3rd was discussed and was suspended until further notice. Indoor fellowship and large gatherings will suspended for the present time. Small outdoor gatherings will be allowed. The IWC welcome gathering scheduled for August 27, 2021 is cancelled. Fr. Samuel will email the changes to all parishioners after he reviews the Diocese's COVID protocol.

Task force update (HTEC and School Vision Team) is waiting for the School Board to complete the needs assessment for the school.

The work on the simplified Mission statement continues with the focus being on the three B's—Belong, Become and Bless.

The finance team will meet and discuss Stewardship as a continuous process throughout the year. Mark Welton will make the meeting arrangements.

The Vestry continues the work of developing an information transfer for Vestry members. Sara May has developed an outline for current Vestry Members to complete. The goal is to create a list of items so that Vestry members can consistently capture and transfer plans, history and key information and pass that on to new members and team leaders.

Financial Review—Russ Casson

The financial reports were presented, reviewed and accepted as presented.

Meeting adjourned with prayer at 9 PM.

Sr. Warden Report

Greetings friends, I hope this finds you all well. I have just returned from my lake cottage on Chautauqua Lake in Western NY. Hard to leave but I am glad to be back, even if it is over 90 every day and COVID is running wild again. Below is a photo taken from the deck of the cottage, we were greeted by a historic steamboat, the Chautauqua Belle, just before I

left. A nice memory to leave with, my grandson watching the Belle from the dock.



While away I became even more thankful for the streaming of our Sunday service. It does provide a sense of connection, no matter how far away I am. Speaking of connection, one of my disappointments upon returning was the need to once again be involved, with Fr. Samuel, in assessing the new COVID Guidelines from our Diocese and re-establishing stricter guidelines for our church, especially the 10:30 service. Just when we were almost feeling normal, we have to slip back into more restrictive togetherness. Very frustrating, especially when there is so much excitement being together to worship as we used to, to enjoy a cup of coffee together, plan fellowship and celebration activities. We feel so much promise for Holy Trinity Church and School, now we are delayed again because the virus is allowed to continue, mutate, and cause illness and death. All because some refuse to be vaccinated, discouraging...... but not hopeless. I still feel confident this too shall end and we will be allowed to get back to the open worship, fellowship, and activities we so enjoy and need.

The Vestry continues to lead the various teams and will do as much as is safely possible to advance our plans for church and school. Our school has essentially reached capacity this year with 45 students, and we have a newly formed school board, led by Jim Kelly, that is working with our head of school, Justin McCallister in governing the school as well as working to continue improvement and growth. Growing the school is of primary importance as it continues to be our greatest asset and ministry.

Within the next month Fr. Samuel will be forming a Nominating Committee for the next Vestry election in January. This next election will require the election of 6 new members (only 3 of current members remain), three will be elected for 2-year terms and three for the normal 3-year term. HTEC&S has a bright future and vision, a strong forward-thinking Vestry working with Fr. Samuel in the lead is critical. I hope you will consider being part of this important and rewarding leadership team.



What's the deal with the cards?

Why have I asked you to save your old greeting cards? The short answer is because I cut them into bookmarks for students at Leesburg Elementary School.

About 15 years ago I came upon the idea of cutting up old cards to make them into bookmarks for my students. As the library teacher, I had about 800 students at a time, so I needed a lot of bookmarks. At about the same time I realized that working on bookmarks on long car trips kept me awake while my husband was driving, so it has become my travel hobby.

I give the bookmarks at Christmastime. I spread a bunch out on a table and allow the kids to pick 2, one to keep and one to give as a gift. This simple act meets a lot of needs for our little ones. First, it is always fun to receive a gift. Many of our students live in poverty and often have not had the opportunity to learn to make choices. The simple act of "shopping" and choosing is empowering. Allowing them to give something to someone else is also empowering. The dearest stories come from kids expressing their love for their parents, their friend, their teacher, their grandparent, as they look for the perfect bookmark to give away.

Some kids do not celebrate Christmas, so I always have pictures of flowers or pets, so everyone is able to participate. The stories that have come from giving these bookmarks are just wonderful. One little girl once saw a picture of the Christ child and exclaimed, "Oh, it's Jesus! I love Jesus!" Or they find a picture of a dog like theirs or search for a Santa or search for a Christmas tree or stockings.



I hope you realize that you are the ones who given me the fodder for creating that joy through your donations of the cards for me to cut up. All occasions, all pictures are welcomed.

I retired in June of 2020. However, I will be volunteering at my old school, the children will always be "my kids" and I will continue the bookmark tradition as long as I am able.

Due to the rise in the Delta variant in our state and community, the diocese has updated its guidelines on how to mitigate the threat. Based on the revised diocesan guidelines and our parish's unique circumstances, the following guidelines will guide our COVID-19 response here at Holy Trinity.

WORSHIP General for all services

- Masks are expected to be worn by everyone for all indoor worship services regardless of vaccination status. If for some reason, you cannot wear a mask, please contact Fr. Samuel for guidance.
- The celebrant and readers may briefly remove their masks to read or speak from a safe distance.
- Seating will be limited to around 50% of capacity
- Seating will be staggered to allow some level of social distancing
- Ushers will guide the seating process and exiting process
- An offering basket will be located at the back of the church; the use of collection bags is suspended.
- We will continue to offer communion bread sprinkled with communion wine until further notice.
- Communion will be brought to you in the pews.
- Hand sanitizer will be provided by the ushers, and doors will only be opened and closed by ushers.
- Restrooms are available in Parish Hall but the kitchen area remains closed with access for employees and other authorized persons only.
- Anyone who is sick, at high risk, exhibits any of the warning signs of COVID-19, or is under the weather in any way is encouraged to stay home and join us on-line to protect the health of everyone in our Holy Trinity family.

- No congregational singing

Sunday 10:30 a.m. Service:

• Reservations required due to capacity limits. Our current attendance at this service has been exceeding the 50% mark. Reservations will be made either electronically or by calling the office no later than Thursday of every week. Congregational singing is allowed

Fellowship

- Indoor hospitality has been suspended
- Refreshments maybe served outdoors as conditions allow

Meetings

- In-person indoor meetings will be determined case by case
- Masks and social distancing will be expected for all indoor meetings at the church.
