Give Thanks with a Grateful Heart

As I write this, some of us are still eating leftovers from our Thanksgiving meal. Memories



of having our families and friends around the table for a shared meal are still fresh. How I pray that the spirit of Thanksgiving will be manifest in all our relationships

throughout the year.

Thanksgiving took on a special significance for me when, during a particularly anxious time in my ministry some years back, I received what I still consider a revelation from the Lord. The revelation was based on the story of Jesus asking his disciples to feed five thousand people (Mark 6:35-44). When they told him they did not have enough to feed that many people, he asked them to go and see what they had. They said they had five loaves and two fish. We are told that Jesus: "Taking the five loaves and the two fish and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke the loaves. Then he gave them to his disciples to distribute to the people. He also divided the two fish among them all. They all ate and were satisfied." (Mark 6:41-42).

Since that revelation I have adopted the attitude of giving thanks under all circumstances; and it has transformed my life and ministry. This does not mean that I don't take worrying and frightening events seriously. Indeed, there are several aspects of my personal life and ministry that are of concern. The recent revelation that there is a new COVID "variant of concern" to world health authorities; is certainly worrying and perhaps even frightening. However, regardless of the legitimate concerns, I choose to focus on the good things - signs of hope. By focusing on the signs of hope, I am able to believe that "in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose." (Romans 8:28).

The General Thanksgiving prayer, on page 836 in our Book of Common Prayer, articulates this attitude by including thanks for "disappointments and failures that lead us to acknowledge our dependence on you [God] alone." The prayer concludes with thanksgiving for "Jesus Christ; for the truth of his Word and the example of his life ...; and for his rising to life again, in which we are raised to the life of your [God's] kingdom."

As I write on this sunny fall afternoon, I am grateful for all of you, my Holy Trinity Church family. I am grateful for your generosity of time, talent, and treasure as most recently manifested through another successful another Stewardship Campaign. I am grateful for your resilience through the challenges of our personal lives and those of our shared life and mission. Above all, I am grateful for the grace of God that enables us to face each new day with faith, hope, and love.

As we begin this Advent season, may our hearts be filled with gratitude for all the blessings of your life – your family and friends, work and leisure, food and shelter, and above all for Jesus the Christ who came that you may have life in its fullness (John 10:10). Because of Jesus, who's first coming we commemorate, and whose second coming we anticipate, may you gladly sing:

Give thanks with a grateful heart, give thanks to the Holy One.

Give thanks because He's given Jesus Christ, His Son.

And now let the weak say, "I am strong." Let the poor say, "I am rich."

Because of what the Lord has done for us; Give thanks.

Vestry Minutes Summary

November 17. 2021

Present: Fr. Samuel, Dan Curtis, Randy Siver, Deb Yee, Mark Welton, David Aldrich, Sara May, Jim Kelly, Peggy Barry, Russ Casson and Barbara Cogley.

Liz Mustin via Zoom.

Fr. Samuel opened the meeting with scripture readings and prayer.

Sara May made a motion that the minutes from the October meeting be approved, second by Jim Kelly and approved unanimously.

A motion was made by Sara May that payment for Rev. Janice Gordon-Barnes substitution on Sundays is designated as Housing Allowance, which we have done regularly in the past, second by Mark Welton, approved unanimously.

Financial reports were reviewed and accepted as presented.

Church Administrator/ Bookkeeper Position.

The transition plan for the Church Administrator/Bookkeeper open position was discussed. Fr. Samuel has arranged for coverage for the office for almost every day until January 14. Some will be volunteering in the morning and some in the afternoon. We are currently advertising for the position and Deb Yee will do the screening of candidates. The following will help Fr. Samuel with the interviewing process: Dan Curtis, Mark Welton and Deb Yee. Fr. Samuel will make the final decision. The positions will be a part-time bookkeeper and a part-time administrator. Advertising has been done on our Facebook page and so far we have two applicants. Russ Casson made a request that he be a part of the interview for the bookkeeper position as he is the treasurer and would be working closely with the individual hired. Russ also suggested that we advertise in the newspaper.

Since the bookkeeper has left and she took care of the pledge cards, the finance committee, headed by Mark Welton will get the pledge cards and complete the information. Russ Casson is doing the bookkeeping for now.

Fr. Samuel and the volunteers will handle the scheduling on the computer and Peggy will be coming in for several days to train Fr. Samuel.

2022 Budget

The budget process was started by the finance committee and Russ Casson. They reviewed the previous year's budget and projections requests. They noted that the last 2 years budget showed a substantial deficit. The PPE did help last year. They feel it is necessary to have a balanced budget.

Expenses for 2022 were discussed and the suggested budget reviewed. Roof and window projects were not included in the expenses for 2022. Reducing the budget was discussed. There is not much variable dollars to spend. The proposed budget will be presented with

adjustments at the December meeting for approval.

Meeting closed at 9:10 PM with prayer by Fr. Samuel.

Next Vestry meeting is December 15, 2021 at 6:30 in the Parish Hall.

Sr. Warden's Report

Dear Friends;

When you read this newsletter Thanksgiving holiday will have passed. I pray you all had a very Happy Thanksgiving filled with gratitude and love. Now as we enter the Advent season and the celebration of the birth of our savior I am reflecting on some of what Fr. Samuel has preached during the 4 weeks leading up to Advent. These were the weeks of our 2022 Stewardship focused campaign. The theme this year being "Every Perfect Gift - comes from God above". This year's messages, especially those given by Fr. Samuel, have been much more impactful on me this year. Maybe because of all the divisiveness in our world, or that I am coming to the end of a 4-year journey as Sr. Warden of your Vestry, or that I just had my 73rd birthday and I have lost several very close friends since March.... maybe it is all these life experiences. The result has been that my sense of gratefulness has grown enormously this fall and the message of Generosity comes from Gratitude really hits home for me. While I could dwell on the anger that persists in our world or be bitter about the loss of so many good friends, I find myself instead being grateful for all the Perfect Gifts God has given me, including those friends who have departed this life. I am blessed with a wonderful family, a deepening faith, a loving companion, warm and loving friends, my extraordinary church family, and the ability and opportunity to share time, talent, and treasure. I find myself wanting to share more because of my gratitude, and ironically the more I share the more gratitude I seem to feel for Holy Trinity

Church and School and positive difference we make in people's lives. A very Blessed Cycle, I pray each of you experience this cycle during this season of gratitude.

Discernment – a word that Fr. Samuel often uses during sermons about giving and serving. He has said our personal decisions regarding stewardship pledging and serving on Vestry are a result of a process of discernment. I thought I generally understood the word but have been feeling I did not in the way that I hear Fr. Samuel use it, or I heard Canon Holcombe use it during our Rector Search process last year, so I finally decided to research its meaning more deeply, I found I was right, I did not have a sufficient understanding.

In the simplest terms, discernment is wisdom. The dictionary defines discernment as, "the quality of being able to grasp and comprehend what is obscure" In the Christian faith, it is a similar concept, but it is bestowed by the Holy Spirit. True discernment starts with prayer. God smiles on those who ask for it. In the New Testament, there are many verses about the difference between worldly wisdom and true discernment, asking Christians to lean on the Spirit for guidance rather than what the world says is right and wrong.

Things in our world may say giving more or serving more, such as Vestry, is not right for us. Fr. Samuel is asking each of us to pray on these decisions, allow the Holy Spirit to guide us rather than what the world around us says is right and wrong. For me, I believe my sense of gratitude and increase in generosity, as was my decision to serve on Vestry 4 years ago, were a result of guidance from God, my discerning what was right for me. If you are considering at all increasing your generosity and / or serving on Vestry I echo Fr. Samuel's call to follow the process of Discernment, allow your decision to be guided by the Holy Spirit.

On November 10th the Vestry held a "Vestry Overview" in the Parish Hall for any members interested in seeking the Vestry or just interested in learning more about it. In addition to most of our Vestry, it was attended by 6 parish members. After presenting an overview of our

organization, responsibilities, and priorities for the last 4 years, Vestry members shared what serving has meant to them. Good questions and discussion followed. As I discussed above, if you have any potential interest in serving, please pray on this and seek guidance. If you have any particular questions about Vestry please do not hesitate to ask any current member or contact me directly at dan.curtis57@gmail.com or at (618) 694-5560. All that is needed is to let a member of the Nominating Committee (Deb Yee, Jim Kelly, Barb Cogley, Dave Aldrich, Sara May, and myself) know by January 5 that you have decided to seek election in the January 23 election, then submit a short Bio by January 10 (for the January 23 Annual Meeting Report). Six (6) new members will be elected at the Annual Meeting and an Organizational Meeting will follow on the 26th to transfer information, elect Jr. Warden and Secretary, and for Fr. Samuel to announce his selection of Sr. Warden. Speaking from experience, serving on your Vestry has been very rewarding, something I am very grateful for.

One more short plea, we are in need of volunteers to help with Hospitality Coffee Hours following our Sunday services. With the cooler weather and our sun shades in place we are able now to do this outside, but we need volunteers to help with the very easy tasks of setting up simple refreshments and then putting items away. We are fortunate to have many newcomers and visitors, these fellowship hours are a wonderful way to get to know them and welcome better as well as to reunite with old friends and fellow worshippers. Eleanor taught Latin and English at Leesburg High School.


Eleanor died after her husband in April, 1965. Both are buried in the churchyard (Cemetery)

The 2021 distribution to Holy Trinity from the Frame Estate was \$17,066.
