Living through Change A Lenten Reflection

We live in a world where things are constantly changing. Change can be positive or negative. It can be intentional or unintentional. Whether we like it or not, change is bound to happen.



Indeed, as we reflect on the meaning of Lent, we realize that change is one of the major themes. As we read through the gospel stories, we notice that the environment is getting more and more hostile and

tense leading to Jesus' crucifixion. Things were very uncertain even as Jesus kept reassuring his disciples (John chapter 14-17).

We at Holy Trinity have and continue to experience significant change. Some of it is positive while the other is negative. Some of it is intentional while the other is unintentional. Some changes we like, while others we don't like. Some of the changes we have control over, others we don't. Holy Trinity is certainly a different church from what it was fifty, twenty, or even two years ago; and will be a different church five, ten, or twenty years from now. All

we can do is to find ways to ensure that Holy Trinity will still be the church that honors God and a source of blessing to His people in this community and beyond.

For us to remain faithful to God's mission in the midst of a changing environment, we will need to continually make adjustments in the way we think and operate. We need to think big, broad, and long-term in relation to our resources, our programs, and our mission. The kind of thinking and operating that will help us not simply survive but thrive in the midst of change will be marked by the following attributes:

Faith: According to Hebrews 11:1, "Faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see." This faith, of course, is not simply in our own natural abilities but in the God who is able to do amazingly more than we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us. (Ephesians 3:20). If our desire is to honor God in whatever we seek to do, then we can count on Him to carry us through.

Flexibility: The fact that we will be called to do things we have not done before will require us to have an open mind to try different things and a willingness to abandon those that do not work. Flexibility also means that we will need to be sensitive to such factors as time and people's feelings.

Creativity: In order for us to meet the needs of our diverse membership and community, we will need to be creative enough to come up with ideas and activities that make sense to as many people as possible. We will need to be sensitive to the current trends and respond appropriately.

Self-sacrifice: Faithfulness to God's mission in a changing environment will call us to a higher level of self-sacrifice not simply in terms of sharing our personal resources but our personal preferences as well. We will be called to learn to give-in and let someone else have their way simply because we cannot all have our way. We will work to bring consensus in everything we undertake but also learn to live with decisions that may not have been our preferred.

Patience: More than anything else, living through change will call for a higher level of patience. Much of what is learned in times of

change is through trial and error. We must be willing to try some things over and over until we get them right. We must be willing to forgive those who disappoint us and give them opportunities to improve.

These are just a few qualities we will need as we move toward the kind of Church God is calling us to be. Pray that God will give us these qualities and the joy of seeing them bear fruit for the benefit of His people and the honor of His name.

To help nurture these qualities of faith, creativity, self-sacrifice, and patience, we are offering several opportunities for study and reflection during this Lenten season. They include a Lenten study entitled "**Words of Life: Jesus and the Promise of the Ten Commandments Today.**" The study will be held on Sunday mornings 9:15 – 10:15 a.m. in the Parish Hall. Another opportunity is the Study of the book: **Parables from the Back Side**" which seeks to connect the parables of Jesus to current realities in transformative ways. This study is held on Wednesday mornings at 10:00 a.m. in the chapel. It is my hope that we will take advantage of these offerings to nurture and enhance the qualities we need to not just survive but thrive in this constantly changing world of ours.

3. The Vestry voted to appoint Debbie Lally to serve as secretary of the Vestry for current Vestry year.

4. Vestry members were assigned to serve as liaisons to various ministries as follows:

5. The Vestry agreed to hold their monthly regular meetings on the 3rd Wednesday of each month from 6:30 p.m. – 8:00 p.m. unless except under special circumstances when the length of a meeting could be extended.

6. The Vestry affirmed the status of Holy Trinity Episcopal School as a ministry of the Parish with a board of directors who provide oversight under delegated authority from the Vestry.

7. The Vestry reviewed and accepted the school and church financial reports as presented by the Treasurer.

Detailed minutes of the Vestry meeting are available upon request. Vestry meetings are open to parish members as observers except for special sessions.

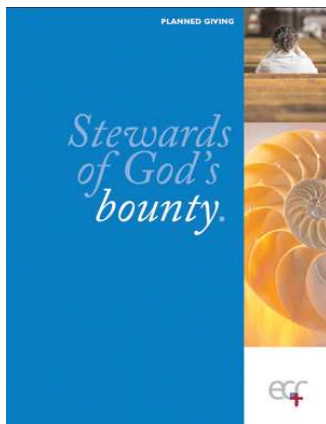

Planned Giving Update and Dinner



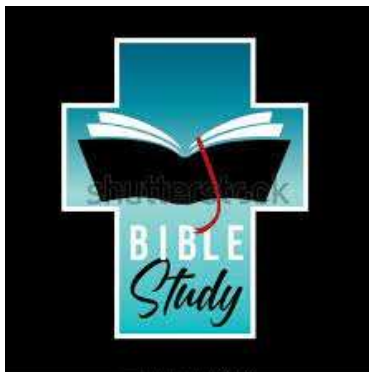
As most of you probably know by now, the Holy Trinity Planned Giving Program is now in progress. Included in this is the good news that our endowment has been funded and is beginning to grow!

Please mark your calendars for this event! More information and reminders, including a request for rsvp's, will be forthcoming in the next several weeks.

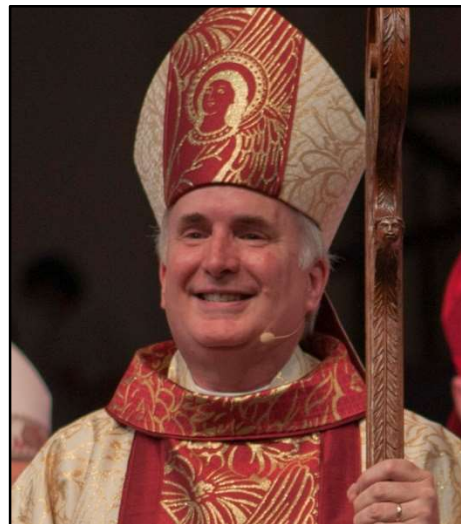

Tutor Strategic Planning

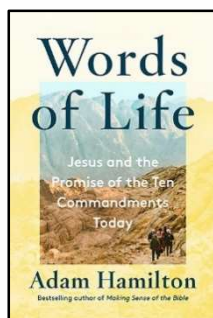

ushers. Our 10:30 service has lost a few ushers who have moved or otherwise become unavailable.

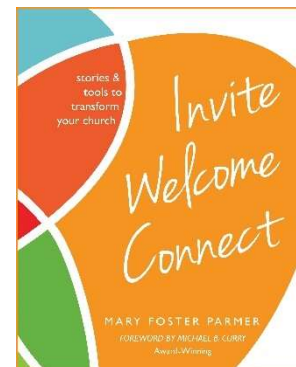

SALVATION ARMY NEWS



Here is some information from Major Marie Harris on their different programs and results of these programs.

During the holidays 2,788 households received help with food including groceries, gift cards and a Thanksgiving meal. There were 988 families that received Angel Tree (Toys/gifts and clothing) Christmas assistance, totaling 2,317 children and seniors. This was accomplished with 5,616 volunteer hours!!!

In January, we served 69 families in emergency services including food, utilities and other financial help through our Social Service Program.

Our outreach teams have been serving a meal on Saturdays in several different areas including Leesburg, Fruitland Park and Bushnell. They leave The Salvation Army at 8:30am and return around noon. During the time they are ministering, they serve a meal, distribute items such as hats, blankets, scarves and mittens. They do assessments to see what their needs are and why they are in the situation they are in. If they are willing to get out of their situation we work with them through our Life Navigation program (Life Nav) to get them into safe housing, looking at the barriers that is preventing that from happening. We serve anywhere from 25-40 each Saturday. This is ongoing Sat. program.

"How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news, who proclaim peace, who bring good tidings, who proclaim salvation, who say to Zion, " Your God Reigns! " Isaiah 52:7

I think the writer of this verse was referring to feet that are carrying a heart transformed by Jesus! A heart of flesh that is ever reaching out to other people. That's who WE are and You Too, because your church people help us. Reaching out to hurting, scared, confused, sin sick people. We have recently formed teams of

people from among us who long to be the hands and feet and voices of Jesus serving in our community.

God bless Holy Trinity Episcopal Church for your year-round support!!!

In total we collected and gave away \$3,098.00 This was wonderful and please know this money will be well spent. \$1,549.00 was mailed to the Diocese, it will be used for Tornado Relief.

This week we took the other check for \$1,549.00 down to Leesburg, to the Leesburg Food Bank Office. The "Back Pack Program is run out of this office. They were so thrilled to receive our check. Pictured on the left of photo is Brenda Duff, she heads the "Back Pack Program," pictured in the middle is Flossie Snow, she is Vice President of the Leesburg Food Bank and lastly pictured is Tom Brown, he is Assistant to Brenda with the work load of running the "Back Pack Program." Brenda used the word desperate when it comes to their need right now. This program is feeding 341 children on Saturdays

and Sundays in our local area. Every Wednesday they deliver food for a total of 341 back packs to multiple schools in the Leesburg area so kids will have food to eat while they are away from school. Just think of the increases you have seen in prices at the grocery store. Brenda sees the same prices as she shops to fill the 341 back packs weekly. From the Back Pew



The Great Freeze 1894 - 1895

By 1894, the Citrus Industry in Lake County was becoming prosperous with more and more acreage developed into groves.

Christmas, 1894 saw temperatures approaching 80 degrees. Three days later a strong cold front brought temperatures that fell into the teens. Most of the citrus crop had not been picked and was frozen. This was followed in January, 1895 with warmer wet weather. Trees responded by shedding leaves and producing sap.

This was the worst that could happen because on February 7 another cold front produced temperatures into the low teens. People reported hearing the trees pop like pistol shots as the freezing sap split the bark ultimately killing a large percentage of the trees.

Many residents gave up and returned to England or moved elsewhere. Fortunately, some remained who had diversified their crops and had financial resources. They kept Holy Trinity afloat during this difficult period.

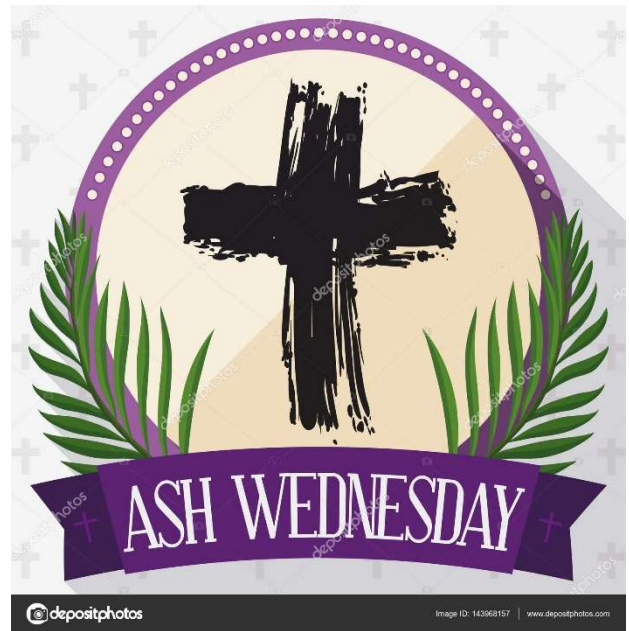

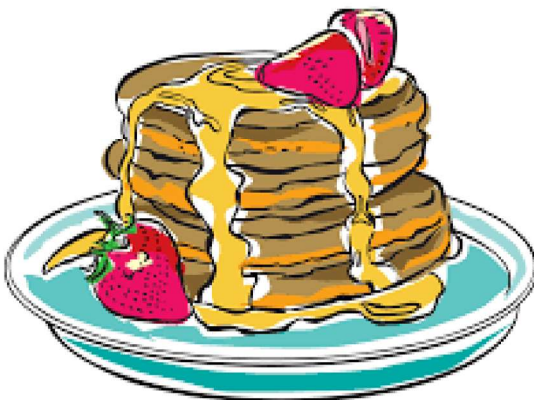
