Telcome to the season of Advent!

During Advent we look back with appreciation for the first coming of



Christ to inaugurate God's Kingdom on earth, and look forward with anticipation of Christ's second coming to fulfill God's Kingdom. On a personal level, it is a time to look back with appreciation, for what God has done in our

lives, and look forward in anticipation of what God will do for us. Advent is a season of appreciation and anticipation.

Even as we continue to live with the uncertainties of our time due to war, disease, political and social instability, and other challenges, we at Holy Trinity have many good reasons to be grateful and hopeful.

Perhaps the greatest gift God has given us is the number of new people who have joined us in the past year. These new friends are already making a difference in our shared life and mission. Gregg & Judy Monin who joined us around this time last year led our recently concluded School Golf Benefit which raised over \$30,000 for our school. They also donated an outdoor nativity set which will add to the beauty of our campus

this Christmas. Dave Lawrence who joined us a few months ago is taking our pictures so we can a pictorial directory to enhance our connections. Many others have joined the various ministry teams such as Altar Guild, Pastoral Care, etc. The coming of Deacon Charlie and his wife Angela has also been a huge blessing to our church family. We look forward to growing and serving the Lord together.

As we look forward into the future, we have reason to believe that God's grace which has sustained us thus far will continue to carry us through the joys and challenges of the coming year. We have reason to believe that the best is yet to come. That said, it is important to remember that our confidence in the God who is able to accomplish abundantly far more than we ask or imagine through His power that is at work within us (Ephesians 3:20-21) requires preparation on our part. Advent is not just about anticipation but more so about preparation.

Preparation

At the heart of Advent is the call to prepare for God's appearing in our lives' circumstances. The words of the prophet Isaiah, as quoted by St. Luke, are particularly compelling:

"A voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him. Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill made low. The crooked roads shall become straight, the rough ways smooth. And all people will see God's salvation." (Luke 3:4-6).

Preparing the way for the Lord begins with believing that God indeed has a good plan for humanity – us as individuals, our families, our church, our community, our nation, and our world. God's plan is to prosper us and not to harm us, to give us hope and a future (Jeremiah 29:11). Preparation also begins by opening our hearts, eyes, and ears to what God is doing and join Him in the mission.

While it may be difficult to discern the specifics of what God might be calling us to do, one general characteristic is that God is always bringing good news. I praise God for the many ways many of you have already participated in God's mission of bringing good news to the less fortunate among us. The success of our Christmas Outreach projects – the Operation Christmas Child, the Salvation Army Angel program, and the ongoing Salvation Army Bell ringing program are demonstrations of a community of faith committed to being heralds of good news.

Like other seasons of the church calendar, the spirit of Advent is not and should not be limited to the four weeks of the Advent season. Christians should always be advent people – always hoping, always anticipating, and always preparing for God's will to be done in and through us.

May this Advent season truly be for us a season of appreciation, preparation, and anticipation for God's appearing in our lives, our communities, and our world. May you have a Blessed Advent, a Merry Christmas, and a Happy New Year.

Life Skill Training at Holy Trinity School

One of the ways Holy Trinity Episcopal School prepares students to become productive citizens is to offer basic life skill training. In addition to the traditional academic course offerings, students can also learn to use and apply basic hand and power tools while working on beneficial school projects. This past month our Head of School asked if there was a chance that the Men's Group of Holy Trinity Church could help with the purchase of a list of tools and accessories needed to expand the training. Within days the Men's Group approved the donation and purchased \$485 worth of requested tools for the school. The funds for this donation came entirely from the proceeds from the monthly Men's Group Pancake breakfasts. On behalf of the HTES School Board, thanks to the Men's Group, especially Sid Yee who did all the shopping for the tools, for their generosity and commitment to helping our school. Food Pantry Donations

During this time of thanksgiving, our school food pantry needs donations. Some of you may not be aware that HTES has a food pantry to supplement or in some cases, provide meals to students who may not have

enough to eat at breakfast or lunch. While the school does not provide meals for students, it is important that each student is fed, as it has been proven that students perform better if they are not hungry. To that end, Mr. McCallister and the school staff ensure that every student has access to healthy snacks and quick lunches if needed.

Most of our students arrive at school having eaten breakfast, and with a bag lunch, however about half of our students' families live at or below poverty level. Because some families struggle to make ends meet, it is not guaranteed that all students will have three full meals a day and our food pantry fills the gap.

Our food pantry currently needs to be restocked. If you are able, the following food items would be greatly appreciated: ramen noodles, peanut butter crackers, uncrushables,* breakfast bars, and Kraft easy mac. For hygiene and allergy reasons, it is important that all items be prepackaged, single serve size with all ingredients listed on the packaging.

Food items may be delivered to the school office during school hours, or left in the parish hall kitchen at any time with a note that they are intended for the school.

Thank you in advance for assisting the school with these needed food items. On behalf of Mr. McCallister, the school staff, students, tutors, and the school board, I thank you for your support of our school and wish you a happy and bountiful Thanksgiving.

Michael Quinlan



My name is Michael Quinlan, a parishioner at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church. I have just been accepted to enter into the formation of the Brotherhood of St. Gregory. I will study for two years, first becoming a postulant and then a novice. At

the end of the two years, I will take temporary vows as a religious brother.

I was born and raised a Roman Catholic in New York. My parents ran a paint store, Home Paint, in Richmond Hill, Queens, NY. We lived over the store. I come from a family of four. My two older brothers, Bill and Raymond, were raised to be business-oriented and became accountants and raised families.

"You are different from your brothers. Your people skills would help you become an ideal priest," my father told me at a tender age. I had an altar in my room and religious pictures, statues and sacramentals among my possessions.

My family was very concerned with helping the less fortunate. In town it was well-known that if you had a problem, Ray Quinlan at Home Paint could solve it. I grew up with this focus as well.

I went to St. John's University and Queens College and studied Education. I was a grammar

school teacher for 25 years. But I never forgot my father's dream. I went on Come and See Invitations from orders for priests and brothers, but still, I didn't decide to apply to any.

I married at the age of forty. Helen Bauer and I raised her four children from her first marriage. We moved to New Fairfield, Connecticut on Candlewood Lake. Upstairs I was affectionately known as Uncle Mike but in the basement was my altar. I said morning and evening prayer.

I was blessed to always feel a closeness with God. Wherever we were as a family or no matter what problems we had I knew that I could depend on God to see us through.

Our marriage lasted until all the kids were grown and on their own. It was a loving marriage but it ended in 2021. Suddenly after 20 years I was on my own and slowly, with God's help I made sense of my life.

The first major decision I made was to start attending the Episcopal Church. For years I was very happy to know that marginalized people were welcomed and cherished by the Episcopal Church. One of those marginalized groups was bisexuals and gays. Helen knew I was a bisexual male and I never cheated on her during our marriage. But with the marriage over, I now wanted a place where I would be affirmed.

I also knew of an Episcopal religious order that openly welcomed gay and lesbian people. That order is the Brotherhood of St. Gregory. I was received by Bishop Brewer at Holy Trinity in April 2022 and the same month I applied for entrance into the Brotherhood of St. Gregory. I was accepted on November 19th, 2022.

The Brotherhood of St. Gregory accepts married men, priests, and gay men. Most members are very active in the Church, but many others hold down their own jobs. Our mission is to bring Christ's love to everyone!

I will stay at Holy Trinity through my two years of formation while keeping my job of resident care associate in The Villages. After that, I may seek out Brothers living in community or live on my own.

I ask for your prayers as I follow my calling in formation.

Christmas Offerings for Sanctuary Hearing Loop: At their recent meeting, the Vestry voted to designate this year's Christmas Offering to the purchase and installation of a Hearing Loop in our beautiful sanctuary. For several years now, the Vestry has been exploring the possibility of adding a Hearing Loop to our sound system to help those with hearing challenges. The technology amplifies the sound for those who have compatible hearing aids but also comes with ear-plugs for those who don't have compatible hearing aids. This project has been necessitated by the growing number of members and guests who have expressed

difficulty hearing our speakers during worship. The project will cost around \$6,000.


