The Walk to Emmaus

This past Sunday we once again read and reflected on the story of two of Jesus' disciples



on the road home to Emmaus from Jerusalem. Interestingly the Methodists have a renewal movement based on the same story, similar to what we know as Cursillo in the Episcopal Church. According its website, the Walk to Emmaus, as the movement

is known, *"develops Christian disciples and leaders by inspiring, challenging, and equipping active adult church members for Christian action in their homes, churches, workplaces, and communities. It also benefits less active members who are seeking to renew a relationship with God, grow spiritually, or discover firmer foundations for their lives."*

As I reflect on the story, I can only say that, it is a reflection of what our spiritual journeys ought to look like. The story highlights several elements of our faith journey that are critical to our spiritual growth and vitality.

1. Walking Together

At the heart of the Christian faith is the need to walk together with other followers of Christ. Christianity is not an individual or solitary religion. It is essentially a communal religion. That is why Jesus reminded his disciples that where two or three are gathered in his name, he will be in their midst (Matthew 18:20); and that whatever they agree and ask in his name, will be granted by his Father in heaven (Matthew 18:19). I can attest to the fact that much, if not all, of my spiritual growth has been as a result of walking with other Christians as spiritual companions/friends, prayer partners, Bible Study classmates, etc. If you don't already have a spiritual companion, I highly recommend that you find one or more. You will be amazed at the difference it will make on your spiritual journey.

2. Talking and Discussing with Each Other

We read that the two disciples were talking and discussing with each other about the things that happened in Jerusalem. Perhaps the most important benefit of having a Spiritual companion is having someone you can talk to about what is happening in your life, in the world, etc. Some of the most miserable people in the world are people who have no one to talk to about what is happening in their lives; particularly the things that bother them. Even more beneficial is having someone to discuss things with. As we all know, talking to someone, especially about traumatic events, is therapeutic. It helps us experience relief, gain new insight, and expand our perspectives. The good news for the disciples is that they did not only have each other to talk and discuss what had happened, they were joined by Jesus who helped them understand what had happened as he "interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures." (Luke 24:27). They recalled that their hearts were burning within them while he was opening the scriptures to them. (Luke 24:32).

As they walked, talked and discussed together, strangers became friends; and were not afraid to invite their new friend (Jesus) to their home for the night. Talking and discussing, even with strangers, has the capacity to cast out fear of the stranger. I can't count the number of friendships

I have that begun with a simple conversation with a stranger.

3. Invitation & Hospitality

The story gets even better and more relevant as we read about the disciples inviting the stranger turned friend to come and stay with them because it was late and not safe for him to continue on. I imagine that beyond the concern for their new friend's safety, they also wanted to hear more about what he had to say. Because of their concern, courage and willingness to welcome the stranger into their home, things were about to get even better. Little did they know that they were welcoming the risen Christ himself. *"When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him ..."* (Luke 24:30-31). No wonder, the author of the letter to the Hebrews advises us to *"not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it."* (Hebrews 13:2). St. Peter echoes the same words by urging us to *"offer hospitality to one another without grumbling"* (1 Peter 4:9).

In a very significant way, the story of the disciples' Walk to Emmaus offers us a blueprint of what it takes to have a life changing encounter with the risen Christ. It takes walking together, talking and discussing together, inviting and welcoming one another, and most importantly breaking bread together.

It is interesting to note that following the encounter, they were no longer afraid of the dark or confused about what had happened. They immediately returned to Jerusalem to tell others what they had experienced.

My own spiritual journey began when I started hanging out (walking) with a work colleague who was "on fire" for Jesus; at the age of 22. I was then a nominal Christian. Together we would discuss matters regarding authentic Christian life as we read and reflected on Scripture using the Daily Guide produced by Scripture Union. A year later, at the age of 23, I encountered the risen Lord at a renewal weekend at my home parish church, and my life has never been the same. Since then, I continue to cherish

walking together with others on my spiritual journey, talking and discussing matters of concern or interest – personal or otherwise, and inviting and welcoming even strangers; many of whom have turned out to be angels.

My prayer is that the story of the Walk to Emmaus will inspire us to be more intentional about walking together, talking and discussing with one another, inviting and welcoming one another in a variety of ways, and more importantly breaking bread (eating) together.

It is my hope that we will each take advantage of the various opportunities being offered in the coming days; such as the upcoming Ladies Luncheon scheduled for Saturday April 29, the School/Parish Picnic scheduled for Saturday May 6 and several others to come. There is no doubt that the more we walk, talk, discuss, welcome and break bread together, the more we will grow spiritually.

“And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another,” Hebrews 10:24-25.

The Vestry met for their monthly meeting on Thursday, April 20, 2023, to discuss matters of importance to the life and mission of our church.

Members Present: Fr. Samuel, Doris Brennan, Debbie Lally, Russ Casson, Steve Knowles, Robin Michell, Mandy Panlilio and Bob Freeman

Members Absent: John Canner

1. The meeting began with an opening prayer from Fr. Samuel.
2. The Vestry reviewed the minutes from March. The minutes were accepted
3. Vestry members presented reports from the various ministry teams. The Vestry reflected on the various reports. Some highlights from those reports include:
 - a. The contract for the new roof has been signed and will begin as soon as permits are received.
 - b. New flooring is being ordered for Grace Chapel
 - c. New ramps for the school have been built
 - d. Some new landscaping has been added to the school compound.
4. The calendar continues to be filled with many activities. Please note the following dates on your calendar:
 - a. May 6th Joint Parish/School Picnic 10:00 am-2:00 pm
 - b. June 10th Consecration of our new Bishop.
5. The Vestry continues to look into ways such as security cameras to enhance the security of our members, students, staff and guests. A 3-member team (Bob Freeman, Steve Knowles, and Michael Lally) are assessing the various needs and will make recommendations to the Vestry.
6. \$250.00 will be sent to the Diocesan of Jerusalem. This will come from Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday & Good Friday Offerings.
7. Online Giving over multiple platforms (website, app, card reader, TEXT, QR Code, etc.) will soon be available. Staff are being trained on set-up, monitoring, and reporting.
8. The Vestry reviewed and accepted the March financial report. A copy of the report is posted in the Parish Hall for those that may be interested.
9. The Vestry selected Randy Siver as the honoree for Holy Trinity Episcopal School scholarship. The Vestry awards a \$1,000 scholarship to a Holy Trinity School High School graduate in honor of someone who has exemplarily served the church and school.
10. The Vestry meeting ended with a closing prayer from Fr. Samuel.

ESports Update

Several months ago, Head of School Justin McCallister shared with us that our students would be participating in a new ESports league. The league is now up and running and HTES has fielded three teams. Mr. McCallister reports that a total of 14 HTES students are participating on 3 separate teams in the league, two teams representing the high school, and one middle school team. The league consists of 12 high school teams, and 7 middle school teams.

The teams practiced for about four weeks before the official season began on February 24th, and during the season they continue to spend 2 to 3 hours a week honing their skills. Competitions are held on Friday after school and are two hours in duration. Students compete remotely with Mr. McCallister monitoring the matches. Congratulations are in order for our teams, as at the conclusion of the regular season, our high school teams were in 4th and 6th place, and our middle school team was in 1st place! All HTES teams moved on to district-wide playoffs.

District playoffs began the week of April 17th, and will conclude on April 28th. As of today, our middle school team still holds the top spot, and our high school teams are in 4th and 6th place. At this time, Mr. McCallister is not aware of which teams will advance to regional playoffs, though it appears that our middle school team is assured of a spot. Those teams that succeed in regionals will move on to state-wide playoffs to determine the state champions at the high school and middle school levels.

In addition to affording our students the opportunity to showcase their gaming skills, the ESports League has allowed our players to develop and practice team building skills along with the concepts of commitment and perseverance. On a school-wide level, participation in the league brings the entire school population together as everyone roots for their classmates, and the teams' successes foster a sense of school pride.

Stay tuned for updates as our teams move on to regional and state competitions.



HTEC School Tutor Update

Under the training and leadership of our Head of School, Justin McCallister, our volunteer tutors are working hard to improve our student's reading fluency and math abilities as the school winds down.

Justin reports that our most recently recruited volunteer tutor, Speech Therapist, Kathy Warner has assimilated very nicely into the school tutor program and is working initially with a small group of students in determining and addressing their needs.

Our next school year will be upon us sooner than we think and Justin is looking ahead to address the future needs of our students. In particular, Joe Elovich has been identified to join our volunteer tutor program. Starting next Fall, he will be working with our students on improving their math skills. Thanks, Joe for joining our dedicated team.

ELECTRONIC GIVING AT HOLY TRINITY

After some time of exploring our options, we recently signed up with Vanco Faith, a Christian Organization that helps churches provide more options for members to financially support the church's mission. Our EGiving program will provide several options including links on Website & Facebook page, TEXT to GIVE, Mobile App, QR Code, and Card Reader. All these platforms will allow our members, friends, and guests to give to a variety of causes related to the church or school.

This resource is not intended to replace the existing methods by which our members give to the church but to offer more options especially to our guests and online audience. We therefore encourage those who give with cash, checks, bill pay, or direct withdraw from the retirement accounts to continue doing so. EGiving is intended to supplement and not replace existing methods of giving.

Due to a special relationship between Vanco Faith & The Episcopal Network of Stewardship (TENS), we will be using this resource on a discounted rate. Donors will have the option of adding the 2.75% processing fee to their donation.

The following are the different ways you could give to Holy Trinity:

1. **Website/Facebook page:** Both the websites and Facebook pages for the church and school will have links to the giving platform where you will be able to give to a fund or program of your choice. You may also reach our giving page through this link:

2. **TEXT to Give:** Once the set-up is complete, we will publish a phone number which people will **text** the word GIVE and immediately receive a link to our giving page.
3. **Mobile App:** The Vanco Mobile app can be downloaded from either the Play Store for Android users or the App Store for Apple users. After downloading, it will ask you to search by name or code. Use the name option by writing

Holy Trinity Episcopal. There will be 3 churches by the same name in different towns. Choose the one with our address. Once you are in the app, you can either give as a guest or register by creating an account which will give you access to other features of the app. Even if you choose to give as a guest, the next time you open the app, it will take you directly to Holy Trinity Fruitland Park.

4. **QR Code:** This QR Code will be available on our publications for people to scan and access our EGiving page. All you need is a QR Code reader on your smartphone.



5. **Mobile Credit/Debit Card Readers:** Donors who do not have smartphones or don't simply wish to do the transactions themselves will be able to swipe their credit/debit card in a card reader handled by an authorized user. For example, if you choose to buy raffle tickets at our School Golf benefit and do not have cash, you could still buy them using your credit card by swiping it through a card reader that will be available at the scene. In that case, the money will be directly deposited in the School's bank account and a report sent to the office indicating the transaction. There are many other situations where the mobile card reader will make a huge difference.

Holy Trinity currently holds services on Saturday at 4:15 p.m. and Sunday morning at 8:00 and 10:30. However, there was a time in the past that services were held much less frequently. Before 1965, Holy Trinity was a Mission and for much of this time was served by

a Priest who was assigned to St. James in Leesburg. In the late 19th Century this Priest, The Rev. Joseph Julian, also conducted services at St. John the Baptist in Montclair, St. Stephen's in Yalaha and St. John's in Brooksville. Records show that in the summer of 1891, Holy Trinity suspended services entirely for 2 months, likely due to the heat and to give Rev. Julian a vacation.

In the early 1920's, services were generally held twice a month; Evening Prayer on the first and third Sunday afternoons. Holy Communion was added to the schedule in 1928 and celebrated on the second Sunday morning.

In the 1950's services were held each Sunday and with the growth in the 1960's after the Rev. Fred Paddock was called to be Holy Trinity's first rector, three morning Sunday services were held; 7:30, 9:15, and 11:00. Holy Communion was celebrated one Sunday a month and Morning Prayer was celebrated on the other weeks.

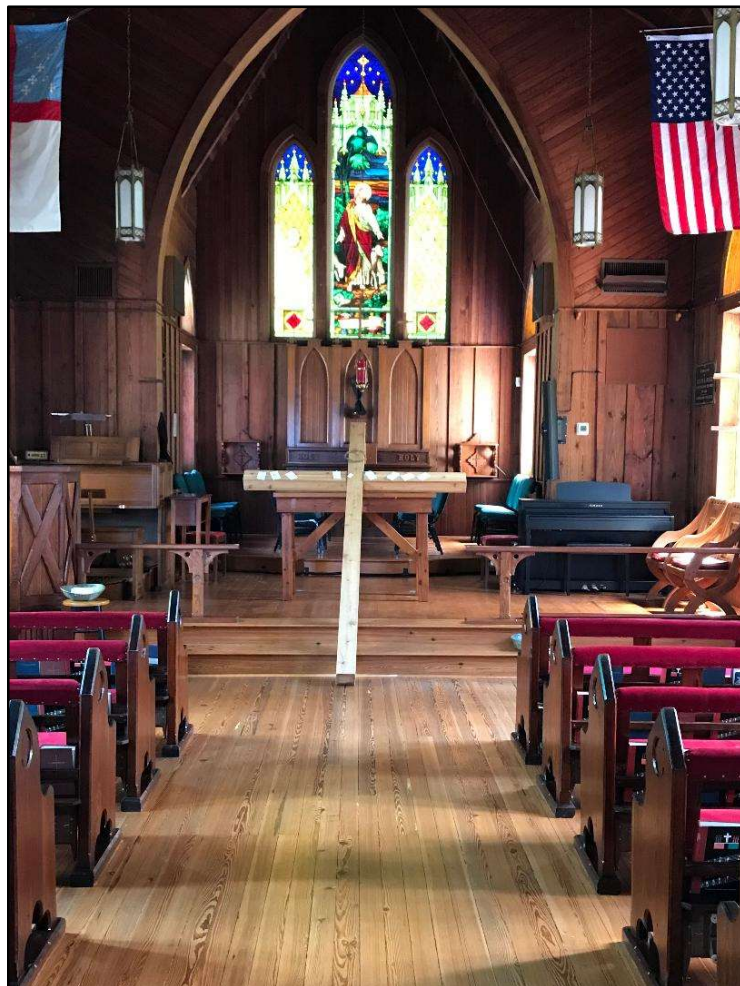

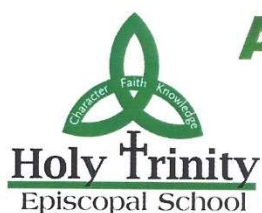

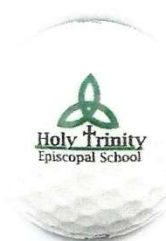
