As we come to the end of the so-called program year and begin the summer schedule, I cannot think of any other words to express my gratitude other than Thank You! Thank You! & Thank You!

The past year has been another busy one for us at Holy Trinity and much has been accomplished. Your generosity of time, talent and treasure has once again proven that with the kind of love you have for God and one another, we can do anything through Christ who strengthens us (Philippians 4:13).

As one who pays attention to every detail of our common life and mission, I can say without fear of contradiction that we truly have come a long way. We are slowly but surely recovering from the setbacks caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, and becoming more and more like the people God is calling us to be – a warm, welcoming and Christ-centered community for all to belong, blossom, and bless..

The program year begun with a very successful Ministry Fair which highlighted all the

wonderful ministries in which we were involved and sought to revive those that had been on hiatus mostly due to the pandemic. As a result, several ministry teams gained new members who have contributed so much. I think about the Altar Guild, the InviteWelcomeConnect, the Buildings & Grounds, the Choir, and several others. Among those revived in the past year was the Women's Ministry which held several gatherings and provided opportunities for ladies of Holy Trinity to form new friendships and strengthen existing ones. Overall, we are in a much better place, as a parish, than we were at this time last year. Our worship, discipleship, hospitality & fellowship, stewardship, Outreach, and other aspects of our shared life and mission have grown significantly.

Beyond the spiritual and social aspects of our shared life and mission, this past nine months have also seen major projects on our facilities accomplished. In November, we dedicated our restored sanctuary windows. Since then, new siding and new ramps were put on the school building, and most recently a new roof was put on both our main buildings – our historic sanctuary and our parish house. We also have a new floor in the chapel and a new air-conditioning unit for the sanctuary to replace one that had died.

All this and more, would not have been possible without the extraordinary and selfless contributions of many of you. I am grateful to everyone who has played a role in getting us where we are. I am particularly grateful for our staff, our Vestry, our ministry teams, and all our members and friends.

Even as we celebrate the achievements of the past program year, we are aware that we still have a lot to do. Indeed, the results of the Congregational Vitality Assessment (CVA) completed by Vestry members in preparation for our annual retreat showed that while our church scored well on almost every aspect, we still have a lot of room to grow. That is why we plan to invite all our members and friends to complete the survey, to help us get a more representative picture of where we are before we can determine the next steps. The survey covers 12 areas of our

shared life and mission and takes about 20-30 minutes to complete.

My hope is that this summer schedule will allow us some time to refresh, reflect, review, and recommit ourselves to the good work of proclaiming God's love in this community and beyond.

## **I Believe in the Holy Spirit**

Many of us are familiar with the above statement from both the Apostles Creed and the Nicene Creed. As I like to say, it is one thing to believe something and a different thing to understand and experience it. If we are honest, many of us believe in the Holy Spirit but have very limited understanding of who the Holy Spirit is and what the Holy Spirit does.

A story is told of a religious education teacher who asked the children to raise their hands if they knew God the Father. All of them raised their hands. When he asked about God the Son, they all raised their hands; but when he asked about God the Holy Spirit, not a single hand was raised. Then one of the children raised his hand and said: "Sir, the boy who knows about the Holy Spirit is not here today."

This may sound funny but it is very true not just with children but with many adult Christians as well. I suspect the main reason why many Christians are reluctant to delve into the nature and ministry of the Holy Spirit are the excesses and sometimes abuses by some Christians who claim to know a lot about the Holy Spirit. As a result, there is a general sense of confusion and suspicion on the subject.

As we prepare for the Feast day of Pentecost, I wish to share my own understanding of the nature and work of the Holy Spirit; with the hope

of clearing some of the confusion or suspicion. I also hope that by sharing my understanding and experience of the Holy Spirit, I may inspire many of you to not only believe, but recognize and embrace the transforming power of the Holy Spirit in your personal and church life.

### **Who is the Holy Spirit?**

According to the Book of Common Prayer, “The Holy Spirit is the Third Person of the Trinity, God at work in the world and in the Church even now.” He is revealed in the Old Testament as “the giver of life, the one who spoke through the prophets” and in the New Testament as “the Lord who leads us into all truth and enables us to grow in the likeness of Christ.” (p. 852).

### **What Does the Holy Spirit do?**

Perhaps the simplest answer is that the work of the Holy Spirit is to transform and equip us. It is the Holy Spirit who enables us to become the kind of people we are designed to be, and to do the work we are called to do. Christianity is all about becoming like Jesus the Christ, and continuing the work he started two thousand years ago. As we rightly admit in our baptismal covenant, we can only be and do what God wants, with God’s help. It is God, through the power of the Holy Spirit, who works in us to will and to act according to His good purpose. (Philippians 2:13).

### **How Does the Holy Spirit Help Us?**

There are many ways by which the Holy Spirit helps us. According to Nicky Gumble, author and presenter of the Alpha series, the Holy Spirit helps us by:

- **Affirming our identity as children of God** – Everyone who believes in Jesus the Christ is a child of God but not every believer feels or acts that way. It is the Holy Spirit who testifies with our spirit that we are children of God. (Romans 8:16).
- **Developing our relationship as children of God** – As is the case with every relationship, communication is key. The Holy Spirit helps us in this process by helping us to pray (Romans

8:26) and to understand God’s word (Ephesians 1:17-18). This makes effective communication with God possible; which enhances the relationship.

- **Producing the Fruit of the Spirit** – All of us are aware of the conflict between what we want and what God wants. It is often referred to as the conflict between the flesh and the spirit. (Galatians 5:17). It is the Holy Spirit that enables us to overcome the flesh and produce the fruit of the spirit which is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. (Galatians 5:22).
- **Bringing Unity among believers** – It is the Holy Spirit that makes it possible for those who believe in Christ to be united in spirit and purpose. Where the spirit is there is love and unity, but where the spirit is absent there is hostility and dissension. The Holy Spirit is the one who can bring people together from different cultures, languages, races and denominations to make them feel and act as brothers and sisters.
- **Giving gifts for the edification of the body and the work of ministry** – Every Christian has the Holy Spirit living in him or her but to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good. To one there is given through the Spirit the message of wisdom, to another the message of knowledge, to another faith, to another gifts of healing, to another miraculous powers, to another prophecy, to another distinguishing between spirits, to another speaking in different kinds of tongues, and to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he gives them to each one, just as he determines. (1 Corinthians 12:7-11). Even though these gifts are beneficial to the individual, they are given for the good of

all and the advancement of Christ's mission in the world.

- **Bringing Growth** – It is the Holy Spirit who brings about spiritual and numerical growth. As the Holy Spirit works in us to bring personal spiritual growth, He also works through us to be credible and effective witnesses for Christ and lead others to him.

As we become more aware of the nature and the work of the Holy Spirit, I hope and pray that we will become more open to his work in us and through us. My own experience is that the more I have become aware and opened myself to the work of the Holy Spirit, the more meaningful and fulfilling my faith has become. I have also realized that just as I need food and water for my physical body, so I need to be filled by the Holy Spirit regularly. Without the help of the Holy Spirit, I cannot be the kind of person God wants me to be or do.

As you prepare for the feast of Pentecost, may this be your prayer and song:

*Spirit of the Living God, fall afresh on me x2*

*Melt me, mold me, fill me, use me”.*

*Spirit of the Living God, fall afresh on me*

When you do, you will surely will receive power to be Christ's witness in your neighborhood, your community and beyond. (Acts 1:8).

### Vestry Retreat

The Vestry Retreat was held at the Warren Willis Conference Center on May 13, 2023. The purpose of the meeting was to:

1. Spend time together reviewing vision and mission as a church
2. Assess our current vitality
3. Begin a conversation on where God might be calling us to be and do

The meeting began with a prayer from Fr. Samuel followed by giving everyone an opportunity to share and catch up with one another. This was followed by a service of morning prayer. This time included a time of reflection on about Frances Perkins. As an



Episcopalian, she is well remembered for being an advocate for industrial safety and persistent voice for the reform of what she believed were unjust labor laws.

To help us achieve the purpose of our meeting, we watched a video titled “Sources of Transformation.” The video highlighted time proven and reliable sources of transformation as Prayer & Worship, Study & Learning, Action, and Life in Community.

Prior to the retreat, each Vestry member completed a Congregational Vitality Assessment (CVA) survey about our church. The results of the survey showed that while our church is doing well, there is a lot of room for improvement. We agreed to invite the congregation to complete the assessment to help us get a more representative picture before we determine the next steps.

The Vestry also focused on the current needs of our Parish. The current needs, excluding the new roof, refrigerator, and A/C unit, includes flooring for Grace Chapel, a problem with the gutter system, an increase to the security system for the church, school and Rectory; as well as a possible fix for the road from the church to the Rectory.

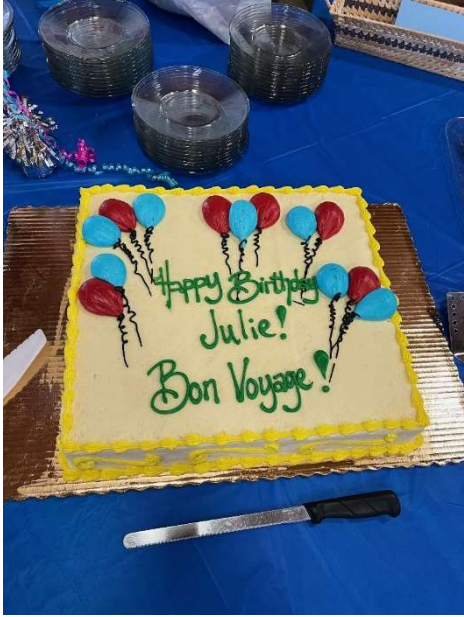

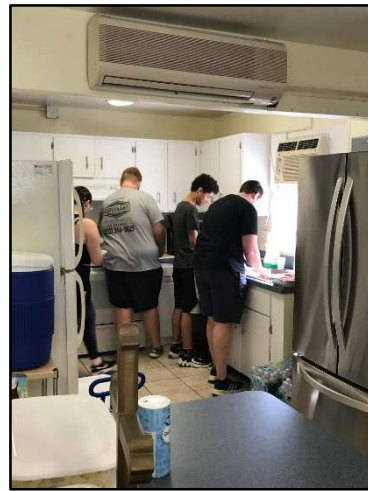
## END OF SCHOOL (HTES) YEAR PICNIC

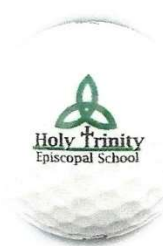
