

Do Not Be Comformed

As we settle into our summer rhythm, with less church programming and some travel for vacations or family events, it is important to not forget who we are and what we are about. Wherever we may be or do, we need to remember our identity, our

purpose, our perspectives, and our priorities.

One of the most helpful scripture passages is 2 Corinthians 5:17: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone. the new has come." (NIV). What this passage clearly says is that some kind of change happens when someone believes and decides to follow Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord of his/her life. Some changes may be instant while others may be gradual.

A New Identity

The first change that happens when we believe and accept Jesus as Savior and Lord of our lives is our identity. St. John clearly tells us that "All who received him, to those who believed in his name; he gave the right to become children of *God.*" (John 1:12). Some will obviously argue that since we are all created in the image of God, we are children of God regardless of whether or what we believe. In a way they are right, but not in the sense that St. John and the apostles understood it. It is very true that God loves all humanity. The problem is that sin has estranged humanity from God. Through faith in Jesus the Christ, we are reconciled to God and restored to that original status as God's children; not just his creatures.

A New Purpose

The second change that happens is our purpose for being. St. Paul referring to the change that occurs says that "All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation..." (2 Cor. 5:18). Peter puts it even more beautifully: "But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people belonging to God, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light." (1 Peter 2:9). Once we are in Christ, we no longer live for ourselves alone but for God and his purposes in the world.

A New Perspective

With a new identity and a new purpose, a new perspective begins to emerge. We begin to look at ourselves and others not from a worldly point of view (2 Cor. 5:16), but from Christ's point of view. Unfortunately, this change is often slower than one would wish. Indeed, that's why many non-Christians accuse Christians of hypocrisy. Our perspectives are often very far from Christ's perspective and very much like everyone else's. We need to examine our perspectives and our attitudes to ensure that they are consistent with our new identity and purpose.

New Priorities

With a new understanding of who we are and what we are about, it should be obvious that our priorities would also change. This is true for many Christians but certainly not all. The way we spend our money, time, and any other resources God has blessed us with does not always reflect who we claim to be. Our priorities should reflect our love for God and one another. During this summer season, may we be careful not to be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of our minds, so that we may discern what is the will of God what is good and acceptable and perfect. (Romans 12:2). Whatever context we find ourselves in, may we strive to be salt and light. (Matthew 5:13-16).

Sr. Warden's Report

As we enter the lazy, hazy days of summer, we are able to sit back, relax and appreciate all we have accomplished the past couple of months.

After waiting for what seems forever, we were able to have our new roof installed. The roof was only half the job. The real work occurred after the roofers left the premises. The clean-up in the Church, as well as the property, was momentous. It was done by a number of dedicated people led by our Jr. Warden, Bob Freeman. We are so grateful to them for putting everything back in order so Services could be held on schedule.

June 2023

The Vestry met for their monthly meeting on Thursday, June 15, 2023, to discuss matters of importance to the life and mission of our church.

- 1. The meeting began with an opening prayer from Fr. Samuel and a prayer said in union.
- 2. Fr. Samuel's reflection centered around our opening prayer. Understanding that this is God's church and we are doing God's work. We need God's grace to do God's work.
- 3. The Vestry reviewed and accepted the minutes from our Vestry Retreat in May.
- 4. The calendar is a little more open during the summer months as many are traveling, getting together with family and friends and enjoying the lazy days summer. That being said, much is happening in and around the church as you will see in the reports from the ministry teams. Please note that the Vestry will not meet in July.
- 5. The Vestry reviewed and accepted the May financial report. A copy of the report is posted in the Parish Hall for those that may be interested. We received a Certificate of Inspection by Mr. Matthew Robertson, treasurer of St. Thomas Eustis, who inspected our Financial procedures and records for the year 2021-2022. The inspection was conducted in accordance with guidelines of the Alternative Audit Procedures authorized by the Diocese of Central Florida.

- 6. The Vestry heard from our Jr. Warden regarding the completed and remaining work on the various projects around our campus. While the roof is complete, there's more to do. The lightning rods for the church must be replaced. New gutters will added all the way around the Parish Hall. The Vestry voted unanimously to move forward with these projects.
- 7. The Jr. Warden also reported on the progress in exploring ways to enhance our campus security by adding security cameras/system and panic alarms for the church, school and rectory. The security committee will meet on Thursday, July 6th for further discussion on this matter.
- 8. Fr. Samuel reported on the progress of several projects such as online giving and others.
- 9. The Vestry meeting ended with a closing prayer from Fr. Samuel.

Consecration of Bishop Justin Holcomb

June 10 was a glorious day in the diocese of Central Florida as we witnessed the consecration of our new bishop, The Right Rev. Dr. Justin Holcomb. The consecration service was held at Calvary Church in Orlando where about 2,000 people including 17 bishops attended the consecration. Holy Trinity was very well represented by Russ & Dianne Casson, Naomi Aldrich, Barbara Turner, Michael Quinlan, Gary Sarto, Doris Brennan, and Fr. Samuel & Rose Nsengiyumva. Russ, Barbara, and Naomi sung in the diocesan choir, while Doris carried our banner in the procession.

The service started with a procession of banners and clergy from the diocese and around the country. Archbishop Josiah Idowu-Fearon, bishop-in-residence, the Church of St. John the Divine, Houston, Texas, former secretary-general of the Anglican Communion and former archbishop of the Anglican Province of Kaduna, the Church of Nigeria, offered a consecration message. The service also included music in English, Spanish and Haitian Creole from a gospel ensemble, a Haitian choir, a youth ensemble and other musicians from churches throughout the diocese.












Holy Trinity Episcopal Church Before and After Work on the Roof


