

Easter is Here!



I am writing this article only a few days from our Holy Week and Easter commemorations. As always our Lenten practice of reading and meditation on God's Holy Word has focused on the person, life, and ministry of Jesus of Nazareth. This week, we will once again be reminded of his suffering, death and resurrection.

Our Lord's suffering reminds us of how he identified and continues to identify with human suffering. In light of immense human suffering around the world, as most vividly displayed on our TV screens, Jesus' own death and resurrection offers us hope.

Throughout the scriptures, we are reminded that we have a God who sees human misery, who hears our cries, knows our suffering, and is working to rescue us. (Exodus 3:7-8). In Lent, we are reminded that Jesus was tempted in every way as we are but did not sin; and that by His grace we are able to triumph over every evil and to live no longer for ourselves alone but for him who died for us and rose again (BCP.379).

Easter, is in essence, a demonstration of God's power to rescue all who suffer. When it seemed like the powers of evil had had their way, God raised Jesus from the dead. Easter is a reminder that evil does not have the final word. God has the final word.

As the apostle Paul reflected on his own suffering from a prison cell, he had this to say:

I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the fellowship of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, and so somehow, to attain to the resurrection from the dead. (Philippians 3:10).

Because of the assurance of the resurrection, he was able to testify that:

We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed but not in despair, persecuted but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed. We always carry around in our body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be revealed in our body. ...because we know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus from the dead will also raise us with Jesus and present us with you in his presence. (2 Corinthians 4:8-10, 14).

As we conclude our Lenten journey and celebrate our Lord's resurrection, may we rest in the hope that whatever we are going through, whatever may come our way, God will see us through. May we have the grace to even:

... rejoice in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance, perseverance, character; and character, hope. And hope does not disappoint us, because God has poured out his love into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, whom he has given us. (Romans 5:3-5).

This year's Easter, for us at Holy Trinity, will bring with it several other reasons to rejoice. We will be rejoicing with 5 of our newest members who will be presented to the bishop for confirmation, reception, or reaffirmation on Sunday, April 28. They have been busy reviewing and reflecting on what it means to follow Jesus in the Episcopal/Anglican tradition. On that Sunday, we will be joining them in renewing our baptismal covenant by affirming our belief that Jesus is Lord and that God raised him from the dead. And that, as St. Paul rightly reminds us, "*No one who believes in him will be put to shame*." (Romans 10:11).

Three Days in March

From Thursday evening, March 28th through Saturday March 30th right after sunset, the Church will be observing the Triduum. Triduum is from the Latin for "three days."

The first of these days is Maundy Thursday, or Holy Thursday to some. The word "maundy" is derived from the Middle English and Old French translation of the Latin "Mandatum" and refers to the "mandate" given by Jesus when he said, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you."

Now there are four words in Greek for our single word "love." They are "eros" which is romantic love; "philia" which is companionship or the love among friends; "storge" which is familial love; and "agape" which is selfless love. "Agape" is the word used for "love" in Jesus' "new commandment" quoted above.

On Maudy Thursday we recall two things. The Last Supper, which is celebrated in the Church as the very first Eucharist, and the washing of the disciples' feet by Jesus.

In those days, foot washing was a necessity, because many people walked around either barefoot or in sandals. And one's feet would get very dirty. But not only was it a necessity, it was a job relegated to the lowest of servants.

So, when Jesus started washing his disciples' feet after their meal it was quite scandalous to them. It was an act of selfless love. So, when we share food and drink and then wash each other's feet, these are acts of selfless love or "agape."

The second of the three days is Good Friday. This is the day when we commemorate Jesus' crucifixion and death. It is a solemn day, and the liturgy reflects this solemnity. The chancel is free of any adornments, having been stripped of them the night before after the Maundy Thursday celebration, The Ministers enter in silence, There are readings from the Hebrew Bible (also known as the Old Testament) a Psalm, a reading from the Letter to the Hebrews, and then the Passion from John's Gospel. A sermon is preached, and the service concludes with the Solemn Collects, other prayers, and the Lord's Prayer. The third and last day of the Triduum is Holy Saturday and after sunset, by the very ancient way days were marked, we shake off Lent and enter into the joyous season of Easter by way of the Great Vigil of Easter, where the Pascal Candle is lit from new fire, and brought into the church by the Deacon who then blesses it by chanting the Exultet. If one listens carefully, one will hear parallels between part of the Exultet and the Great Thanksgiving which begins the Eucharist. And the Pascal Candle will be lit for every liturgy throughout the Great Fifty Days of Easter.

Maundy Thursday will begin in the Parish Hall at 5pm. We will have prayers and the washing of feet, followed by the Agape Meal. The meal is a simple one. It is an attempt at duplicating The Last Supper. We will dine on meatless soup, pita bread, cheese and an assortment of fruits. There will be wine, grape juice, water and coffee. After the meal, we will go to the Church for Service and the "Stripping of the Altar". This is a very moving ceremony in our We lead up to Christmas with happy Church. celebrations and decorations. The "Stripping of the Altar" is a stark reminder of what we will be remembering, a very solemn time in Christ's life. I believe it captures the sadness and gravity reflected the next two days in the Church.

Friday The Stations will be done at 12pm. The Stations will begin outside and work its way into the Church. There will be a Good Friday service at 6pm.

Saturday, the most important of all services in our Church – The Easter Vigil. The Vigil will begin outside with the lighting of the Paschal Candle. The celebrants will then proceed into the Church. This service begins at 8pm.

Easter Sunday will be like all Sundays – services at 8am and 10:30.

We can all take a breath and relax, at least for the first week of April.
